Hogle regarded present wells adequate and held that enlarged storage facilities would remedy a situation which frequently forced removal of patients because of insufficient or impure water.

Large sedimentation tanks would relieve the situation, Best declared, by enabling the institution to keep pumps working and storing water in the reservoirs.


