

PALACE IN NEW DRESS TO OPEN SATURDAY

Thousands of Dollars Have Been Spent in Changing the Entire Auditorium So as to Make It Ready for a New Form of Entertainment.

THE first formal morning opening of a theater in Indianapolis will be held Saturday at 11 a. m., when Loew's Palace on Pennsylvania St., opens its doors.
An expenditure estimated at around \$500,000 has been spent in redecorating the entire theater, installing a new pipe organ, and the placing of new rugs, carpets and art treasures.
Many high officials of the Loew New York office will be here for the opening of the theater Saturday. Among those who will be here—Col. E. A. Schiller, vice president and general manager

of Loew's; L. K. Sidney, general production supervisor; W. A. Finney, western division manager; E. A. Kaye, supervisor of stage and lights; Miss Anne Dorring, charge of decorations; Joseph Vogel, assistant to Col. Schiller and E. A. O'Brien, supervisor of productions.
Howard W. Foereste of Reading, Pa., will be manager of the theater. Charles Winston has been here for some time in charge of publicity.
A cooling system has been installed so as to make the Palace an all year house. A large new pipe organ has also been placed and is now being tested.
Many of the art treasures are from the Vanderbilt home in New York and the home of the late Judge Gary.
The policy of entertainment will be continuous from 11 a. m. daily. It will be made up of three parts: movies, stage band with acts and a novelty overture by a pit orchestra. Teddy Joyce, formerly with the Capitol Theater, New York, will be master of ceremonies and in charge of the band during the stage presentation.
Emil Seidel, well known in this city and nationally famous as a pianist, will direct the concert orchestra.
The movie for the opening bill will be Mary Pickford in "My Dream Girl."
LOOKING OVER
NEW KEITH SHOW
Broadcasting part of an act over the radio to the audience is more or less a novel idea. However, that is the stunt used by Dalley Paskman's radio minstrels of station WGBS.
Sitting on one corner of the stage is the horn. A prologue and some music are received by the audience before any one is seen. As novel as the idea may be it distorts the speaking and singing so that one gets the impression that he is listening to a radio of some years ago.
Dave Irwin and Nat Busby are the endmen. Irwin has a fair voice and improves the situation with some songs of the semi-classical type, leaving the blues to his partner, Nate Busby. This blues singer is also an excellent eccentric dancer. Jack Rice is the interlocutor and announcer, who introduces George Zorn in impressions of "Honey Boy" Evans and Kramer and Stone who are tap dancers. The latter two are good.
The Diamond Studded Quartet sings a medley of old-time "barber shop" numbers. One of the men is a good yodeler. The radio minstrel band plays the accompaniments and several selections of their own. In all, a good company.
Harr, Lang and Bernice Haley have a funny comedy skit entitled "Who Is Your Boss?" It is just plain old time hokum and a play on words, but it's a scream. Lang whistles some piece while Miss Haley sings it. I tried to get under his whistling to hear what kind of a

voice the young lady had, but it was impossible. Lang was too loud.
The only other act on the bill is an acrobatic turn by Louis and Cherie. All their work is done on the rings and bars. The twirling stunt that they finish with is one of the best acrobatic ideas I have seen in a long time. Their work is not brilliant, but it is without a doubt good.
