

JEWETT, BROWN EXPOUND VIEWS IN G.O.P. MEETS

Plead for Party Interest, Praise Governor Jackson at Irvington.

Irvington Republicans, incorporated and nonincorporated, heard Charles W. Jewett, Republican gubernatorial candidate, and John J. Brown, State tax board chairman, respectively, as principal speakers at Monday night's weekly sessions.

Addressing the incorporated body at Carr hall, 5436 E. Washington St., Jewett bemoaned public apathy in politics and government and urged a revival of public interest in parties and candidates.



MUSCLE SHOALS IS SAVED FROM POWER TRUST

Norris Government Operation Bill Appears Certain of Adoption.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—Muscle Shoals again has been saved from the power trust and Government operation of its hydro-electric facilities as provided in the Norris bill appeared certain of adoption by the Senate today.

Any hope of private interests operating the plant went glimmering on the first test vote, when Senator Harrison's amendment was defeated 45 to 25.

The Harrison amendment had provided that an attempt be made to lease the power dams to private interests before going ahead with Government operation. Several other amendments along this line were automatically eliminated by the vote.

Little hope was seen for the cyanamid bid, as its supporters, Senators Heflin and Black of Alabama, were defeated in every attempt to amend the Norris bill.

Heflin's first amendment, providing for a Government farm board to regulate distribution of power under the Harrison plan, mustered only 11 votes.

Senator Caraway attached his amendment by unanimous vote. It clarifies the Norris bill so that fertilizer manufacture under cyanamid process can be started at Muscle Shoals immediately on adoption. Norris provides that profits from sale of power be used for building of fertilizer plants and their operation by the secretary of agriculture.

Senator McKellar's amendment specifically providing power for fertilizer manufacture at Muscle Shoals and completion of necessary facilities for that purpose, also carried. Norris accepted both the Caraway and McKellar amendments before they were voted.

Norris then suggested several amendments, which he said had been agreed upon among Senators. These clarified clauses dealing with fertilizer manufacture.

As it now stands the Norris bill provides for Government operation of Muscle Shoals both as a power producing plant and as a fertilizer works and both on as large a scale as possible under the present development of the facilities there.
