

CALIFORNIA IS BEHIND HOOVER; PEACE IN PARTY

Solid Vote in Primary for Secretary: Johnson Unopposed.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 22.—The Hoover candidacy has brought peace to the California Republican party and ended a ten-year feud between the Hooverites and the forces of Senator Hiram W. Johnson.

Announcement of the personnel of the Hoover delegation ticket brings to light three things. First, it shows that the cream of the State's political leadership has been skimmed to make the Hoover home guard. Next, it shows a solid phalanx of the party ready to unity that will doubtless roll up the biggest vote ever cast for a Republican nominee. Finally, it gives assurance that Hiram Johnson will go to his party on the August 28 primaries unopposed by any candidate of imposing support.

In the Hoover delegation will be an almost fifty per cent representation of old tried-and-true Johnsonites. And not one of the outstanding Hooverites selected are of the type of Johnson haters that have made the party a battleground for years. The ticket will be headed by Governor C. C. Young, a member of the Johnson old guard, and Byron Pitts, lieutenant governor and hero of the ex-serve boys.

As alternate for Young, Banking Superintendent Will C. Wood stands as a balance-wheel, for he has been loyal to both Johnson and Hoover. At the head of the ticket will also be Charles Neumiller, chairman of the State Central Committee, one of Johnson's staunchest guardsmen. The names of such Johnson leaders as Senator Frank Flint and Joseph Scott of Los Angeles, State Director of Public Works, Bert B. Meek, Editor Ralph Bull of Eureka, the laborite Will French, prove that the

The names of Harry Chandler, Ralph Arnold, Eddie Dickson, men who run a temperature at the mention of Johnson's name, are conspicuously absent. Lieutenant Governor Pitts, whom these men have been urging to oppose Johnson's renomination in August, has just given further demonstration of cooperation by refusing to announce his candidacy. CHICAGO SCHOOL HEAD IS OUSTED BY BOARD'S ACT

Upholds McAndrew Suspension for Insubordination.

CHICAGO, March 22.—Chicago's famous "textbook" trial is ended—Superintendent of Schools William McAndrew has been removed from office—but Mayor William Hale Thompson's fight against "pro-British propaganda" in public schools has just begun.

The board of education Wednesday found McAndrew guilty of insubordination and conduct unbecoming his office, on which charges he was suspended, Aug. 29, 1927. The penalty was dismissal.

McAndrew was charged by Mayor Thompson with fostering pro-British and anti-American propaganda in the schools through use of certain textbooks. In twenty-seven sessions of the trial 6,000 pages of evidence and testimony were read to these charges, but in the board's resolution of dismissal direct mention of the charges was avoided.

The board held the trial furnished proof "there is an organized pro-British anti-American propaganda of stupendous proportions in our country with deep ramifications extending to and through our schools, colleges and other educational institutions."

The report closed with a recommendation that school boards of the Nation "investigate the textbooks under their jurisdiction to the end that treason-tainted textbooks may be eliminated from the public school systems of the country."

Attorneys for McAndrew announced a petition for review will be filed as soon as the testimony and evidence is examined.

W. C. SPROUL IS DEAD
Former Governor of Pennsylvania Ill for Months.

Sproul, who was 58, was long prominent in the public affairs of Pennsylvania. He was known as "the father of good roads in Pennsylvania" and for twenty-two consecutive years was a member of the State Legislature.

For the last two days Sproul had been unconscious.
