## HOOSIERS HONOR SENATOR WILLIS

Eulogize Ohio Solon as Public Servant.

Indiana Republican leaders, shocked by the sudden death of Senator Frank B. Willis of Ohio, joined today in expressing tribute for his character and attainments.

Senator Arthur R. Robinson said Senator Willis was a conscientious public servant, patriotically devoted to the welfare of his country. His judgment on public questions was highly respected by his colleagues in the Senate, with whom he was always popular. I feel a sense of keen personal loss in his passing, for I had known and admired him for more than a quarter of a century.

Others who eulogized the deceased Senator in formal statements included Governor Ed Jackson, Miss Dorothy Cunningham, Indiana Republican National committee woman; Frederick E. Schortemeier, Secretary of State; Dr. E. S. Shumaker, Indiana Anti-Saloon League Superintendent; Louis Ludlow, Washington correspondent, and M. Bert Thurman, manager of Senator James E. Watson's presidential campaign.

Senator Willis was well-known throughout Indiana, having addressed many Republican meetings in this State. In January, 1922, he addressed the Indiana Republican Editorial Association at the Sevierin.

Church Dedication Sunday  
TIPTON, Ind., March 31—This city's new \$75,000 Presbyterian Church will be dedicated Sunday with members of other congregations here attending. The new building replaces a structure burned two years ago.

On Wednesday Dr. Amos W. Butler, author of "Birds of Indiana" and honorary member of the Indiana Academy of Science, will speak on "The Teaching of Nature Study," and S. E. Perkins III, on "Bird Banding." Perkins is president of the Indiana Audubon Society and counselor of the Indiana Bird and Banding Association.

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
