DRAFT GOSSIP

Debate Possibilities Open
to 'Keynote Speaker' at
G. O. P. Convention.

WASHINGTON, April 4.—Selection of Senator Simon D. Fess of Ohio is "keynote speaker" for the Republican national convention next June has set political tongues wagging here.

Fess is one of the original "Draft Coolidge" men and he has indicated he still believes the President will deliver the guiding address to the delegates. Political followers here can already see the possibilities that are open to Fess in his speech reviewing the achievements of the administration and the President.

The selection was made by the committee on arrangements in which Republican leaders favoring the "Draft Coolidge" movement are influential—leaders such as Chairman William M. Butler of the national committee and Charles D. Hilles of New York.

Senator George Moses (Rep.), New Hampshire, who was chosen permanent chairman, has pronounced himself in favor of the nomination of Secretary of Commerce Hoover.

THE smartest high-hat fun that Gilbert and Sullivan have given us is to be found in "Iolanthe" or "The Peer and the Peri."

The Winthrop Ames' Gilbert and Sullivan production of "Iolanthe" is on view this afternoon and tonight only at English's.

As we are least acquainted with this opera, I went to the Shubert at Cincinnati last week and saw this company in it.

It is important that we realize in sufficient numbers that these classics of Gilbert and Sullivan are on view at English's this week. I again call your attention to these operas and I take the liberty to recommend "Iolanthe" as done by this company as the smartest fun in satire that we have had here in many seasons.

Vera Koss is seen as the Fairy Queen and she has a chance to use her splendid voice in a number of lovely tunes. She was splendid in "The Mikado," but she is magnificently grand in "Iolanthe." In this opera you have Fred Wright as the Lord Chancellor and I think that he is at his best in this role. The chorus of peers and other members of parliament who become fairies is the best ever assembled. Here is a fine fun, beautiful melodies presented by a most capable company. I am making a plea that if you want the best that you at least see "Iolanthe" today at English's.

OUTLINES NECESSITY OF
FARM RELIEF MEASURE

W. H. Settle Declares McNary-Haugen Bill Should Be Passed.

Five reasons why it is vitally necessary to the farmers and the nation that the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill be passed by Congress were outlined for the directors of the Indiana State Farm Bureau Federation Tuesday by William H. Settle, president, who has just returned from Washington.

"The reasons that this bill is of the utmost necessity to the nation," Settle said, are: "The social and political stability of the nation requires an agrarian policy which makes possible the continuance of the institutions of independent land-owning farmers."

"Common justice requires equality for agriculture with industry. No means has been suggested without government subsidy for providing it other than as proposed through the principles of this bill."

"A sustained farm purchasing power is of first importance to the industries and labor of the nation. Industrial exports are incidental and constitute less than 5 per cent of our commerce."

"Settle declared that to deny the farmers relief legislation would be equivalent to denying them an opportunity to enjoy American standards of living."

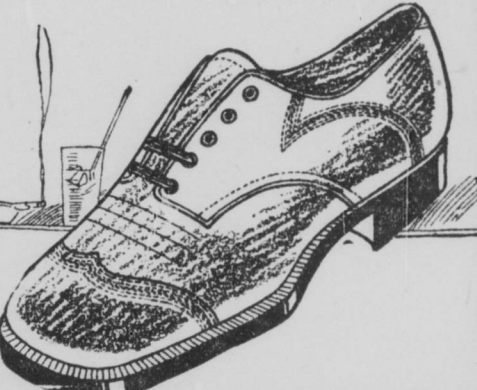
