

PLANS ARE MADE FOR 'ACTORS' BIG SHOW

Twelfth Annual Midnight Frolic as Climax of National Vaudeville Week Will Be Held at the Palace Theater Thursday Night.

ON Thursday night at Loew's Palace a benefit show will be given as the climax of National Vaudeville Artists' Week, which is being observed in all variety theaters of the country.

This is a worthy cause, a much worthy one, as the funds obtained this week from such shows will be used to complete the building of a tuberculosis sanitarium at Saranac Lake, N. Y.

The following statement has been issued regarding those in charge of this midnight show Thursday night:

All of the actors and actresses who happen to be in the city on Thursday night will join together in the Actors' Twelfth Annual Midnight Frolic at the Palace Theater. This frolic will be the climax of the National Vaudeville Artists' Week in Indianapolis. Besides being one of the outstanding entertainment events of the year, it is a charitable effort that is meeting with the hearty support of public officials and theater men.

Once each year a week is set aside by the National Vaudeville Artists during which they make efforts to raise funds to be used in aiding the sick and needy of their profession. The particular purpose in raising money this year is to complete construction of a tuberculosis sanitarium for vaudeville actors and actresses at Saranac Lake, N. Y.

All the leading theaters of the city are joining in the observance of the week and are offering talent for the Frolic. The project also has the endorsement of Mayor L. Ert Slack, who in a letter to William A. Hough, manager of B. F. Keith's theater, states his willingness to invite support by the citizens of Indianapolis.

The letter follows: "My attention has been called to National Vaudeville Artists' week to be observed in Indianapolis and throughout the United States this week. It gives me the opportunity of calling the attention of the people of Indianapolis to a matter of interest and very great benefit to our 'no mean city'."

"The appeal made by this institution of National Vaudeville Artists, dedicated to the men and women of the stage who provide wholesome entertainment and pleasure for millions of people, is a very worthy appeal and it should be a great pleasure not only to attend these performances because each one is outstanding in its character, but because of the opportunity to give and provide funds for charitable purposes and relief of those artists who have done their work of providing entertainment and pleasure in times gone by and who are now in need of relief.

The opportunity which will present itself on Thursday night at the Palace theater should be met by a large attendance.

Will Follow 250 Hounds to Tennessee's Premier Hunt Friday.

JOHNSON CITY, Tenn., April 11.—Down in the Happy Valley of East Tennessee where pioneer patriots gathered for prayer before they marched to the battle of King's Mountain men of prominence throughout the nation will meet on Friday—the thirteenth—the South's greatest fox hunt.

Acting as host to the assembled sportsmen, politicians, financiers, business men and writers will be "Uncle Alf" Taylor, former Governor, whose home at Milligan College, three miles from here is near the scene of the hunt.

More than 250 hounds in the pack that will be released Friday night. Never before, in this district, have so many trained hunting dogs been gathered in one pack.

"Old Limber," the fox hound which is nearly as noted as the former State executive, will start the hunt.

"Uncle Alf," though 80 years old, is still a lover of the chase and he issued invitations to 750 friends who had desired to participate in one of the famous southern fox hunts.
