

BASE PRIMARY FORECASTS ON OLD RESULTS

Dopesters of Both Parties Consult Records for 'Clews.'

Speculation on the outcome of the Indiana primary election, May 8, is causing the political dopesters to thumb through primary records of recent years for clews to the relative strength of candidates "then and now."

The primary returns of 1924 and 1926 form a common starting point for the reckonings for both major parties, but agreement ends there and the significance of the recorded figures has a different interpretation in every candidate's camp.

As a contribution to the popular sport of political prospecting, the primary records covering President, Governor and United States Senator in 1924 and 1926 are given here:

ADAMS' DEATH MAY DELAY DIVIDENDS

Payment of Cooperative League Creditors Set for May 7.

Payment of a 20 per cent dividend to Cooperative League of America creditors scheduled for May 7 may be delayed by death of Reily C. Adams, trustee, president of the Security Trust Company, today.

Hearing on claim of Matson, Carter, Ross & McCord and Bingham & Bingham, Indianapolis attorneys for the trustee, for \$35,000 partial attorney fees in the \$1,600,000 league bankruptcy was conducted Tuesday by Carl Wilde, referee in bankruptcy.

Three thousand claims have been allowed, and 30 per cent dividends paid. The league went into receivership in May, 1923, and into bankruptcy the following October.

FOUR CHILDREN DIE WHEN HOME BURNS

Perish in Bed When Parents Try to Save Them.

SISTERVILLE, W. Va., April 18.—Four children were burned to death and two others burned seriously when fire destroyed the Denton Tenant home near here today.

The dead are: Brooks, 10; Vonda Bell, 8; Garet, 7, and Betty Lee, 3, all children of Mr. and Mrs. Denton Tenant.

Harlie Tenant, 23, and Dennis Tenant, 17, were burned badly and are in Sisterville hospital.

Gas, leaking through a defective stove hose connection, ignited from an oil lamp and caused the blaze.

The small children were in bed and perished despite frantic efforts of the parents to save them.
