

## OVER WILL INSURE LABOR SQUARE DEAL

Roosevelt Lauds Secretary  
as Friend to Workers  
and Farmers.

MUNCIE, Ind., May 3.—"Senator James E. Watson is as likely to be selected as party standard bearer in Kansas City as I am to be chosen Emperor of Japan," declared Theodore Roosevelt, former Assistant Secretary of the Navy, at a Republican mass meeting here Wednesday night in behalf of Herbert Hoover's presidential candidacy.

"I have nothing to say against the senior Senator from this State," said Roosevelt, "but no one in the country believes that the senior Senator has a chance for the Republican nomination for President. He does not believe he has himself."

"A vote for him, therefore, is a vote for the back room conference type of politics. A vote for him is equal to saying that you do not care to express your opinion as to whom the candidate shall be."

Roosevelt reviewed Hoover's career as engineer, organizer and as a public servant.

"I believe we should nominate Herbert Hoover," he said, "because of his great administrative ability, because of his vision, because of his humanity, because of his cleanliness and because he will be a man whom we can elect President of the United States."

Roosevelt branded as "willful lies circulated for purely partisan purposes," statements that Hoover is not a friend of the farmer and that

he pegged the price of wheat at \$2.20. "Hoover is a friend of the American farmer," he said, "and was the man who prevented the European countries beating down the price by buying through one agency with no agreement."

"Hoover is a liberal as regards labor. He knows that the country never can be permanently sound unless the American working man is getting a square deal, an ample wage and the chance to present his side of the case. He has worked steadily for stability and economy in industry."

Of political corruption in the State and nation, Roosevelt said: "This corruption is more threatening than any other danger that confronts the country. Herbert Hoover is the man to deal with it. He is a clean idealist. The men he gathers around him will be the same type. Herbert Hoover will tolerate no crookedness."

## RUSHES WEST IN PLANE

New York Man Uses Aircraft and Vessel to Reach Honolulu.

NEW YORK, May 3.—The first transcontinental airplane flight for keeping a distant business appointment was started today by P. B. G. Morris of this city. He traveled as a passenger in a mail plane from Hadley Field, New Brunswick, N. J. He plans to arrive in San Francisco on Friday at 4:30 p. m.

From there he will cover the last leg of his journey to Honolulu by water, in four days, sailing on the crack Matson Liner Malolo at noon Saturday. The complete distance of 5,400 miles will be covered in six days.

## WOMAN LEADER ON STUMP FOR N. Y. GOVERNOR

Nellie Ross Says Smith Is  
Democrats' Only Hope  
in 1928.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 3.—Al Smith or four years more of political oblivion for the Democratic party.

This is the choice presented to the Democrats of a dozen Western States by Mrs. Nellie Ross, ex-Governor of Wyoming, here on a Smith tour. Mrs. Ross is a dry by principle and record, a Protestant, and has been widely talked of as a running mate for the New Yorker to take together the mountains of the West and the sidewalks of New York.

Her reasons for Smith's nomination and election have made a profound appeal not only to her own sex, but to the progressive minded leaders of her party.

"Governor Smith is an ideal candidate for the West," she is saying. "Out here our chief problems are water conservation and popular control of water power. We can not protect these last and greatest of our remaining natural resources without Federal aid."

"And in these United States there is no man who has proved his ability to cope with the private power trust as has Governor Smith."

"Yes, I am a Protestant. I think the attempt to bring this into the campaign as an issue is a violation of the letter and the spirit of the Constitution. And I am a 'dry,' as you can see by my record. But prohibition is not an issue either."

"Enforcement is an issue, and I believe we will have better and more honest enforcement under Smith than under any man I know."

"Governor Smith is making a peculiar appeal to the women of the States I have visited. In him they see a man responsive to the things they hold dearest—child welfare, education, protection of women in industry, hospitals, the elevation of the unfortunate."

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## Charges Fee of \$10 a Week for Girls' Cafe Tips

NEW YORK, May 3.—Alice Foote MacDougall, who has been widely commended for her striking success as a business woman, has let the public in on one of her success secrets.

She charges waitresses \$10 a week for the privilege of carrying trays and picking up tips in her Grand Central Terminal restaurant. That face came out when one of the girls paid her \$10 and then was discharged before her week was up.

When the company refused to refund the girl's \$10, she went to court where she won considerable sympathy from the judge.

To counteract the criticism resulting from the court exposure Mrs. MacDougall explained that tips at the branch restaurant in Grand Central run as high as \$12.50 a day.

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## DISEASE PERIL LURKS UNSEEN, ALWAYS NEAR

Scientists Afraid to Lag in  
Unceasing War on  
Germ Foes.

WASHINGTON, May 3.—Large cities complacently viewing new waterworks, reservoirs and conduits and feeling secure in their endeavor to give their citizens pure water will be interested in warnings contained in the presidential address of Dr. Theobald Smith, pioneer American student of bacteriology, before the Congress of American Physicians and Surgeons meeting here.

"The sewage problem is unsolved," he said. "All we have done is to convert our water courses in open sewers with occasional explosive outbreaks of intestinal disease as the result."

"The time is coming when the intimate relation between water supply and sewage disposal suddenly will develop acute crisis in the sanitary affairs of large communities."

Although civilization has widened the aseptic zone about the individual and through cleanliness has decreased many diseases.

Nevertheless, as Smith demonstrated, the great industrial concentrations of people have counteracted this advance to some extent. Colds, pneumonias, influenza and other

respiratory diseases probably will increase, he predicted.

Nor is mankind confronted with only a known array of enemies in the germ world, new diseases are likely to appear. The virulence of disease organisms waxes and wanes, the micro-organisms themselves undergo changes and learn how to attack those peoples and animals that seemed to have been immune to them.

Smith, head of the Rockefeller Institute's animal pathological laboratories near Princeton, N. J., considers the animal world as a great reservoir of potential human disease.

Some animals play a damaging role in the cycle of dread maladies, such as the rat in bubonic plague, but there are many other diseases, which human beings can contract, which lack only one link to make them a powerful menace to the race.

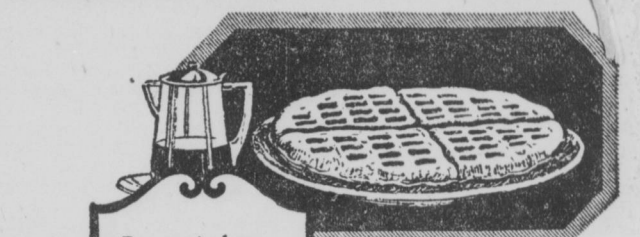
Had the early races of man discovered and used any method of rapid transportation, Smith said, it would have been highly destructive or fatal.

Infections, fresh and active, due to the animal surroundings of our early ancestors, were in the caves, such days kept isolated by the lack of travel and the slow migrations.

If in the present progressive economic era the preventive work of medicine was stopped and the germs given free play, Smith would expect a world with stationary or declining population.

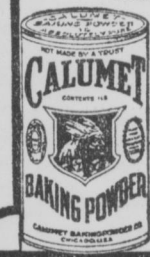
Leaves Earlham Faculty
