

OCEAN FLIERS SETTLE ROUTE OF U. S. TOUR

Leave Wednesday in Sister
Ship of Bremen for
Middle West.

NEW YORK, May 7.—The crew of the trans-Atlantic monoplane Bremen gave formal approval today to the itinerary for their air tour of the United States and Canada. Baron Gunther Von Huenefeldt, Maj. James C. Fitzmaurice and Capt. Hermann Koehl will leave Curtiss field, New York, at 9 a. m. Wednesday for Philadelphia in the Junkers monoplane F-13, sister ship of the Bremen.

Schedule Outlined

Their schedule follows:
Arrive Philadelphia 10:15 a. m., leave 9:45 a. m. Thursday for Cleveland, arriving 12:45 p. m.; leave for Chicago 1:45 p. m., arriving 5:30 p. m., Friday and Saturday will be spent in Chicago, and they will leave for Milwaukee at 1 p. m. Sunday, arriving at 2 p. m.

Leave Milwaukee noon Monday, arriving at St. Louis at 4 p. m. Tuesday to be spent in St. Louis; leave 11 a. m. Wednesday for Detroit, arriving at 3:30 p. m.; spend Thursday in Detroit, leaving at 10:30 a. m. and arriving at Boston at 6 p. m.; spend Saturday and Sunday in Boston, leaving for Montreal at 10 a. m. Monday and arriving at 2 p. m.; leave for Quebec at 11 a. m. Tuesday, arriving at 2:30 p. m.; leave at 11 a. m. Wednesday, May 23, arriving in New York at 4:30 p. m.

Fitzmaurice threw out the ball to start the game, and all of the fliers seemed particularly interested in watching Babe Ruth.

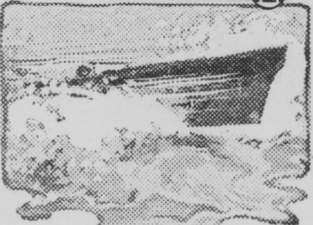

ROBBERS FLEE WITH POSTAL SAFE IN AUTO

Robbers carted away a postoffice substation safe from the Ralph Orr grocery, 1301 N. Bellefontaine St., police discovered early today. The safe contained \$250 worth of stamps, \$150 cash, and valuable papers.

Federal authorities and Lieut. Perrott, police Bertillon expert, examined fingerprints on an auto-

They broke open a cellar window to enter and then evidently carried the safe to their automobile and were forced to take the cushion out to get the strong box in.

WATSON IS SCORED

De Pauw President Protests Lies About Hoover.

GREENCASTLE, Ind., May 7.—Putnam County Hooversites find pleasure in the verbal spanking which L. D. Murlin, De Pauw University president, administered to Senator James E. Watson, De Pauw alumnus and "favorite son" candidate for Indiana's presidential preference vote in the primaries Tuesday.

"While I have been for Herbert Hoover, it has not been my intention to take a formal or active part in this campaign," Murlin said at a Hoover rally here. "But I am here tonight in protest against this kind of campaign and the kind of statements that are being made against him."

"The favorite son of this State

is an alumnus of the university of which I am president, but the charges, which are untrue and unjust that are being made against so great a man as Herbert Hoover by those who are supporting the 'favorite son' are unbefitting to James Watson, unbecoming to his supporters and unbecoming to the State of Indiana."
