

## Fishing The Air

All references are Central Daylight Saving Time

The Indianapolis Power and Light Company station, WPEM, will operate on central daylight saving time beginning today. WKBF, the Hoosier Athletic Club station started on the new time Monday. Programs of the two local stations are listed today on daylight saving time. All other references in this column are to central standard time today. Beginning Wednesday all programs will be listed in The Times on the daylight schedule.

A VARIETY of programs, including an address by President Coolidge and the final laps of the Indianapolis Speedway 550-mile international motor race, will be offered radio listeners Memorial day, Wednesday, by the National Broadcasting Company through associated stations of the NBC Red, Blue and Pacific Coast networks.

Before a microphone in the National Cemetery at Gettysburg, Pa., where Abraham Lincoln dedicated a portion of that field as a final resting place for those who here gave their lives that nation might live, President Coolidge will deliver an address within the hearing of millions of listeners who tune in associated stations of the NBC Blue network. This Memorial service will go on the air at 1. In addition to the President, Governor John S. Fisher of Pennsylvania, will be heard in the role of presiding officer and the Rev. A. E. Wagner, D. of the Christ Lutheran Church, Gettysburg, will read Lincoln's Gettysburg Address.

Through the NBC Red network beginning at 10 Wednesday morning a half-hour program commemorating Memorial day will be broadcast from the Soldiers and Sailors Club of New York. Miss Frances Rodgers, president of the club's board of directors, will read several poems to piano accompaniment, including "Lest We Forget," "The Americans Come" and Joyce Kilmer's "I Have a Rendezvous with Death."

Beginning approximately at 2:10 the Indianapolis Speedway will become the center of interest for listeners of the NBC Red and Pacific Coast networks. From here Graham McNamee will describe the last hour of the 500-mile motor race.

Tonight at 7, through twenty stations of the NBC Red network the Eveready hour will dramatize the events in the life of General Robert E. Lee, leader of the Confederate Army. Lee's refusal to accept the command of the Union Army, preferring to remain loyal to his native State, Virginia, and the historical meeting between him and General U. S. Grant when Lee surrendered at Appomattox Court House, will be re-enacted with musical background furnished by the Eveready Orchestra, directed by Nathaniel Shilkret, and the Hall Johnson Singers.

Melodies from the land of thistles and heather will be offered by the Siebeling Singers in their broadcast tonight at 6:30 over the NBC Red network.

Such numbers as "Mary of Argyll," "Loch Lomond," "Annie Laurie" and "Turn Ye to Me" need little introduction, even to those of the non-kilted races. As usual, the Siebeling Male Quartet, singing orchestral arrangements rather than regular vocal forms, will be heard between choruses and numbers by the orchestra.

Two Yiddish folk songs, a song from the Hebrew text, a Schubert "Serenade" (not the one so widely known, but a song rarely heard which this celebrated composer wrote especially for contralto and male chorus), five "love ballades" and other numbers will feature a choral program to be broadcast from WBAL, Baltimore, at 7 tonight by the Meyerbeer Singing Society of the Maryland metropolis, a male chorus of thirty-five voices.

Vocal and piano soloists will assist the chorus in rendering this concert.

An orchestra conducted by Cesare Sodero will play the overture to Mendelssohn's "Midsummer Night's Dream" as the opening number of the program by the Continentals, an NBC grand ensemble. This program will be broadcast through stations associated with the NBC Blue network tonight at 8.
