

ROGERS BRIDGE OPENING IS SET FOR AUG. 28

Pike and Davies Counties to
Hold Celebration at
Dedication.

Official opening of the big bridge across the east fork of White River on State Rd. 57 at Rogers is scheduled for Tuesday, Aug. 28, according to the weekly bulletin of the State highway department issued today.

Pike and Davies county citizens plan a celebration, with dedicatory exercises. Governor Ed Jackson and Albert J. Wedeking, chairman of the State Highway Commission, will speak. More than 5,000 are expected to attend.

Road conditions are listed in the bulletin as follows:

Road 3—Detour two miles north of Muncie to Hartford City eighteen and one-half miles. Detour from Petroleum to Bluffton.

Road 15—Bridge run-around two and one-half miles south of LaFontaine. Detour at LaFontaine one mile.

U. S. Road 27—Detour south of Richmond seven miles. Detour from Richmond to Chester five miles lifted about Aug. 19.

Bridge run-around two miles north of Richmond. Detour from Fountain City to Winchester nineteen miles. Detour one-half mile west of Berne to one mile south of Monroe five miles. Detour from seven miles north of Decatur to Ft. Wayne seven miles.

Road 28—Detour five miles south of Rd. 32 four miles. Bridge run-around at Beardstown. Detour from two miles north of La Porte to Junction of Rd. 20 two and one-half miles. (Open to light traffic only at driver's risk.)

U. S. Road 31—One-way traffic south of Kokomo.

Road 34—Detour from Veederburg to Road 41 one and one-half miles. Detour between Road 41 and Crawfordville changes as surface treating progresses. Detour from Crawfordville to New Ross fourteen miles, eight of which is paved.

Road 37—Detour from two miles north of Paoli to one and one-half miles north of Orleans is ten miles. Bridge run-around four and one-half miles north of Bloomington. Traffic drive carefully.

Sullivanville. Detour east of Pennville is four miles for east-bound traffic and six miles long for west-bound traffic.

U. S. Road 41—Detour at junction of Road 34 two miles. Detour from one-half mile north of Attica to eight miles south of Howell twelve miles. Bridge run-around two miles north of Kentland. Detour from two and one-half miles south of Kentland to Ade is ten miles. (Lifted about Aug. 20.)

Road 43—Detour north of Romney is five miles.

Road 45—Bridge run-around one and one-half miles south of Rock Hill and one mile and one and one-half miles north of Chrisey. Detour from Dale to Huntington is twenty-three and one-half miles; fair.

Road 46—Traffic should drive carefully past workmen at narrow approaches to bridge three and one-half miles east of Nashville.

U. S. Road 52—Detour in West Lafayette. Detour from four miles southeast of Rushville to Andersonville is nine miles, 130 is thirty-three and one-half miles. No suitable local detour.

Road 62—Detour from Corydon to New Albany is via Palmyra over Roads 35 and 130 is thirty-three and one-half miles. No suitable local detour.

Road 66—Detour from two miles east of Evansville to Newburg is eight and one-half miles. Impassable between Newburg and Hartford. Detour to detour through traffic avoid Road 66 and route via Roads 45 and 62 until further notice.

Road 67—Detour at one and one-half miles east of Vincennes to Bicknell is fifteen and one-half miles.

U. S. 150—Detour between West Baden and Paoli is fifteen miles.

GATES OF U. S. BAR 1,800,000; ADMIT 167,000

Army of Immigrants Seeking Promised Land Fails to Dwindle.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—The present restricted immigration law is holding back approximately 1,800,000 people who have signified their desire to United States officers abroad to migrate to this country, immigration officials said today. This army of people who have declared they would come to this country if not held back by immigration law barriers, is almost ten times the annual immigration quota of 167,000.

According to the immigration officers who are present gathering world-wide figures on the pressure of the population movement toward the United States, experience since a policy of restriction was adopted completely has upset the view that after Europe had had a few years to recover from the world war there would be no great impetus to come to this country.

The United States, they assert, still remains the promised land for people in all parts of Europe, and there has been no appreciable let-up during the last few years.

One of the striking changes in the

pressure on United States immigration quotas during the past few years, it was stated, is in England, where the number of people, at present about 150,000, who have signified a desire to make their home in the United States almost has doubled in the past three years. The heaviest pressure, it was stated, continues to be in southeastern Europe and the Near East.

GOVERNOR OUT OF IT

Had No Hand in Revoking Parole of Prisoner, Says Jackson

Governor Ed Jackson declares that he had nothing to do with the revocation of the parole of Bertram Watson, Negro political leader and paroled slayer of a railroad brakeman.

Watson was returned to the State prison Wednesday by Schuyler Lawrence, parole agent.

"The parole agents watch for any breaking of the parole and if anyone is so caught he is returned to prison," Jackson said before leaving. Watson was arrested on a charge of operating a gambling game at his Indiana Ave. pool room, but was freed in court.

It was reported that Jackson gave a verbal order for the revocation at the State prison.

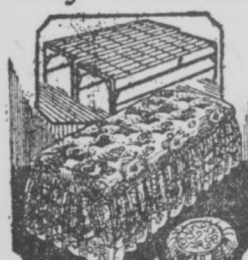

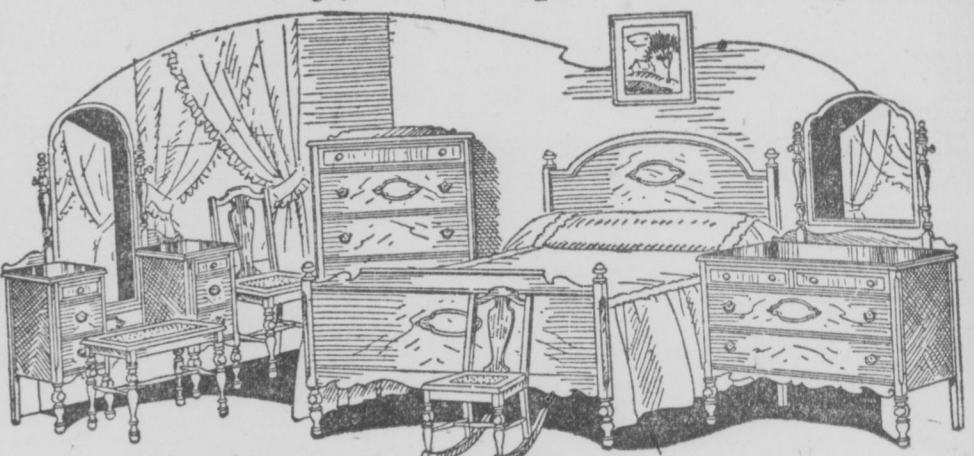

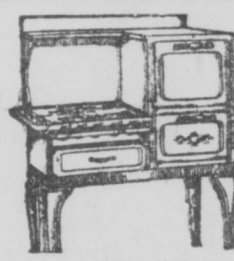
