INSULL GRAB OF SCENIC SPOT IS CONFLICT GERM

Cumberland Falls, Place of Great Beauty, May Be Ruined.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—Samuel Insull of Chicago, power magnate, shortly will become a sort of public park proprietor if his company accepts the terms of a license for a hydro-electric power development at Cumberland Falls, Ky.

Merrill recommends that the Cumberland Hydro-Electric Company, controlled by Insull's Mid-West Utilities Company, be allowed to dam the Cumberland River above the falls for power development, provided the company agrees not to dry up the falls entirely, and to carry out plans to convert the lake which will be formed into a public boating, fishing and swimming resort.

subject of sharp controversy, on the ground that it would destroy scenic beauty at Cumberland Falls.

If the Insull company and the Kentucky State authorities approve the license terms recommended by Merrill, Interior Secretary Roy West, formerly close business associate of Insull, will be one of three members of the Federal Power Commission to give final authorization for the power development.

Under terms of the license recommended by Merrill today, which is said to have preliminary approval of Kentucky State authorities, the Insull interests are required to allow enough water to continue to run over the Cumberland Falls to make their development and make it accessible to tourists.

Cost of the park development, it was stated at the commission, is to be defrayed from revenues derived from the sale of power.

This plan, according to public utility experts here, brings into sharp focus one of the knottiest problems with which the Federal commission is faced in endeavoring to facilitate hydro-electric development, and at the same time protect navigation and scenic beauty.
