This shows that it isn't just what you do, but how on the vaudeville stage. The fall is as ancient as the hills, but this man in this team uses it as the climax of a Russian burlesque dance. He gets his head caught in the lid of a concert grand piano. He falls here and he falls there. He gets his face slapped and he falls some more.

The way this man delivers his stuff proves that he knows his theater and he introduces the Hilton Sisters, known as the Siamese Twins.
