

# 1,600 STUDENTS EXPECTED AT ATTUCKS HIGH

Instructor Staff Larger Than Last Year in Negro School.

Sixteen hundred students are expected to begin the 1928-29 school year Monday at Crispus Attucks High School, West and Twelfth Sts., which was opened last fall for all Negro students.

According to officials, the teaching staff will be made up of fifty-five instructors for the term, an increase of five over last year.

Mathias Nolox, principal, who studied in England during the summer, stated that the instructors for the fall term are from the Universities of Illinois, Cornell, Northwestern, Indiana, Chicago, Ohio State, Howard, Brown, Colorado and Boston.

All seniors and students who previously have not attended Crispus Attucks are to report at 8 o'clock Monday morning. All freshmen are to report Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Announcement has been made of the resignation of Fr. Royal S. Hoagland from the pastorate of St. Philip's Protestant Episcopal Church, Walnut and West Sts. He has been pastor there since June, 1925.

## Decides to Resign

"After three-year study of conditions, I find it impossible to continue under the regime of St. Philip's Church. I now am pastor of St. John the Divine of the Orthodox Episcopal Church, a branch of the Holy Catholic Church, which enjoys racial autonomy," said Mr. Hoagland in his statement.

"We are members of the varied Order of Priests and Deacons and have our own archbishop, His Eminence George Alexander McGuire. I expect to be elevated at an early date to the office of arch-deacon with jurisdiction over Indiana and adjacent territory.

"Services will be held Sunday Sept. 16 in our new location," concluded Mr. Hoagland.

An "airplane" building fund campaign has begun at Shiloh Baptist Church, Walnut and West Sts., with \$5,000 as the goal in the next ninety days. The Rev. Judge I. Sanders is pastor.

## Sentenced to Death

CHATSWORTH, Ga., Sept. 7.—Mrs. Eula Thompson was sentenced in Circuit Court today to die in the electric chair Sept. 21, for the murder of Coleman Osborne, a country storekeeper, a year ago.

It was the second time the woman had been sentenced. She appealed her first sentence, but the plea was refused.

If clemency is denied she will be the first woman to die in the electric chair in Georgia.

## CONFESSON RAPPED

Accused Youth Has Alibi, Says Guard Officer.

A letter from a National Guard officer today cast doubt on the confession of Milburn Jones of Danville, Ind., that he and three other youths had staged a series of four teen holdups.

The letter received by Detective Chief Jerry Kinney said that Harry Noey, 432 S. West St., was with the National Guard at Camp Knox at the time Jones said he was participating in some holdups.

Noey, Vatchel White, 757 Virginia Ave., and John McCarty of Sheridan, Ind., deny they were involved in the holdups. McCarty, however, has admitted being involved in fraudulent check operations.

White voluntarily surrendered to detectives Wednesday night, saying he understood he was wanted, but was innocent.

Noey and McCarty declare Jones was "crazy with loco weeds," doped cigarettes, when he made his confession.

Prince to Hunt Big Game and Visit Remote Regions.

LONDON, Sept. 7.—The Prince of Wales, accompanied by his brother, Prince Henry, Duke of Gloucester, started Thursday on what may be his last empire tour as Prince of Wales.

The prince and his brother were to sail for East Africa, one of the few parts of the British empire that Wales has not visited.

The tour might be described as the final stage in the training of the prince for his eventual reign over 400,000,000 subjects.

The home engagements of the Prince of Wales have grown so numerous that soon it may be impossible for him to spend more than a few days at a time away from home.

Cover 3,000 Miles

In addition King George, now 63, occasionally experiences periods of indifferent health which, while they would be comparatively trivial to a younger man, cause concern for one of the king's age.

The prince's tour will include visits to Mombasa, Rhodesia, South Africa and Capetown, covering 3,000 miles by rail and auto.

Visits will be made to some of "Darkest Africa's" most remote regions, where the prince will have his first shot at a lion. He has been practicing up on his marksmanship. The prince is likely to encounter every variety of animal, ranging from the elephant to the rabbit-sized dik-dik.
