

## 22-MILE DETOUR WILL CALL FOR CARE IN DRIVING

Several Sections of Paving Open to Traffic of Sunday Autoists.

A twenty-two-mile detour, to permit the grading contractor to cross old Rd. 37 at three places between Bloomington and Bedford while preparing the new railroad before paving, has been created from four miles south of Bloomington to Bedford.

The detour has many sharp turns, steep grades and narrow bridges, but the surface is in good condition. The detour, however, according to the State highway commission bulletin, must be driven with care. It will be possible to use the regular State road between Bloomington and Bedford within a few weeks, as the crossings will have been completed.

Several detours and run-arounds have been lifted and sections of pavement built during the summer are open to traffic. Road conditions:

Road 2—Detour from Illinois line to Road 41 is five miles; good except for one and one-half miles.  
Road 3—Detour around construction at two miles north of Madison to Hartford City is eighteen and one-half miles. Detour from Petroleum to Bluffton is nine and one-half miles.  
Road 7—One-way traffic bridge at ten miles north of Madison and seven run-arounds at six and one-half and ten and one-half miles north of Madison.  
Road 10—Bridge run-arounds at junction with Road 53, two miles east of North Ellettsburg, and at three miles east of Bass Lake. Detour east and west of Culver is ten miles.  
Road 15—Bridge run-around at two and one-half miles south of La Poudre. One mile detour at La Poudre. Detour of bridge east. Detour from New Paris to Waterford is four miles.  
U. S. Road 24—Bridge run-around at two miles east of Croftland. New pavement open from Monticello for four and one-half miles east. Detour from Burdettville is two miles. Detour just east of Huntington one-half mile.  
Road 25—Detour. Logansport to Rochester account of paving is thirty-one miles.  
U. S. Road 27—Detour between College Corner and Liberty for detour. Detour from Liberty is nine miles. Detour two miles south of Richmond is five and one-half miles. Detour from Fountain City to Winchester is nineteen miles. Part of new pavement may be open by Sept. 8. Detour at one-half mile west of Berne. Detour from seven miles north of Decatur to Pt. Wayne is seventeen miles. Detour from Decatur and Steuben Counties to Pleasant Lake is four miles.  
Road 28—Detour from Williamsport to Attica is two miles. Bridge run-around at five miles east of Attica. Bridge run-around five miles west of Romney. Detour at Romney is two and one-half miles. Detour at three miles east of Romney is five miles. Detour from Farmland to Winchester is nine miles.  
Road 29—Detour five miles south of Road 22 is two miles. Detour at intersection of Road 32 is four miles. Bridge section of Road 32 is four miles. Bridge south of Middleport. Detour at six miles north of Knox to two miles north of Bass Lake is nine miles. Detour from two miles north of La Porte to junction of Road 29 is two and one-half miles.  
U. S. Road 30—Run-around at Erie Railroad crossing at two miles east of Schererville. Nine miles south of road from Hanna to State Road 29 in poor condition. Bridge run-arounds at sixteen and seventeen miles south of Pt. Wayne. Heavy traffic use marked five mile detour.

U. S. Road 31—Detour at one mile southeast of Rochester is two miles.  
Road 34—Detour from Veederburg to Road 41 is one and one-half miles. Detour between Road 41 and Crawfordville changes as surface treating progresses. Detour from Crawfordville to New Ross is about fourteen miles, eight of which are pavement.  
Road 35—Detour from three miles south of Salem to one mile south of Salem is three miles; narrow road in fair condition.  
Road 37—Detour from Paoli to one and one-half miles north of Orleans is twelve and one-half miles. Condition fair. South of Bedford workmen are building shoulders (ten mile speed limit). Detour from Bedford to four miles south of Bloomington is twenty-two miles. Bridge run-around five miles north of Bloomington.  
Road 38—Detour east of Hagerstown is two miles.  
U. S. Road 40—Bridge run-around at Stillville.  
U. S. Road 41—Detour at junction of Road 34 is two miles. Detour from one-half mile north of Attica to Carbonale is nine miles. Bridge run-around at two miles north of Kendall. Detour from two and one-half miles north of Kendall to Ade is ten miles.  
Road 43—Detour north of Romney is five miles.  
Road 44—Detour from Connorsville west is six miles.  
Road 45—Bridge run-arounds at one and one-half miles south of Rock Hill and one mile and one and one-half miles north of Christian. Detour from Dale to Huntington is twenty-three and one-half miles.  
Road 46—Short detour in New Point.  
Road 50—Bridge run-around just west of Seymour. Detour from junction of Road 1 and 50 via Milan and Mooresville to Aurora is twenty-two miles, part only fair.  
U. S. Road 52—Detour from four miles southeast of Rushville to Andersonville is nine miles. Detour from Brookville to State line at West Harrison is eighteen and one-half miles in Indiana and three and one-half miles in Ohio. Indianapolis to Cincinnati traffic route via Rushville and Brookville, then over detour marked at bridge at two miles west of Vevay is two and one-half miles.

## FIND SKELETON OF PREHISTORIC AMERICAN BOY

Discovery Sheds New Light on Little Known Tribe of Aborigines.

HURLEY, N. M., Sept. 7.—The little skeleton of a prehistoric American child, still adorned with all its tiny bracelets and trinkets, is one of the outstanding discoveries of the archaeological expedition to the Mimbres Valley sent out by the Mimbres Valley Institute of Arts and the Santa Fe Museum.

Out of 157 burials found by the expedition, this grave contained the largest number of articles, it is announced by Dr. Albert E. Jenks, anthropologist of the University of Minnesota, and leader of the expedition.

Apparently, this child was much lamented and was laid away with great care. Following the custom of these aborigines, the child's head was covered with a beautiful pottery bowl, decorated with a sun. One arm still wore seven tiny shell bracelets and near the knees were eight shell tinklers.  
A tiny copper bell, with the string

still preserved after many centuries by contact with the copper, was one of the child's possessions that is

attracting special interest of the archaeologists, since no object of this sort has heretofore been found with this ancient tribe.  
Scattered in the grave, their string long since decayed, lay 1,500 tiny red and blue-black beads and a small shell pendant. A little bone ring was another toy or ornament.  
The Mimbres Valley people are among the least understood of the early inhabitants of North America. Dr. Jenks and his expedition have spent six weeks excavating fifty rooms among the ruins of their houses and unearthing old burials in order to find new clues to their place in American prehistory.  
"The Mimbres people are believed to have abandoned their dwelling sites somewhere about 600 A. D.," Dr. Jenks states. "Their occupation of the sites probably goes back to 2000 B. C. They have no known descendants."

One mystery of the Mimbres is how a people who must have had a fairly crude manner of living could have produced such beautiful and artistic pottery designs. Another mystery is how and why this art so completely disappeared.  
"The designs on the Mimbres pots far surpass the work of any other Indians of either prehistoric or modern times," the anthropologist declares.
