Edgar H. Felix, who will supervise the broadcasting from the Crystal Studio of the Radio World's Fair, to be held in Madison Square Garden the week of Sept. 17, has arranged afternoon and evening programs for each of the six days of the exposition's run.

Seven New York stations will pick up the Garden programs. These include WABC, WEAF, WGBS, WJZ, WMCA, WOR and WRNY.

Broadcasting will be continuous from 2 p. m. to 11 p. m., with the exception of the hour between 5 and 6 o'clock.

A higher degree of simplicity in tuning, as well as improved quality, will be the trend for the coming production of radio receivers. Sets that can be tuned for specific stations by merely pressing a button are appearing on the market. Press a button and the station desired "comes in" on the loud speaker, clear and distinct; the only other adjustment necessary is the volume control, which must be separate, to enable the set to cope with varying local conditions.

In the earlier days of broadcasting, sets contained as many as ten to fifteen controls for tuning and adjustments, and the operator had to be expertly familiar with each of these controls or no-reception could be accomplished.

Another complete religious musical service will be brought to the radio audience in the Cathedral hour to be broadcast by twenty-one associated stations of the Columbia Broadcasting System at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon.
