

## PLAYS LESLIE AS JACKSON, COFFIN CHOICE

Whipped 9 to 1 in Primary, Yet Handed Nomination, Craven Reminds.

KOKOMO, Ind., Nov. 2.—Defeated by Republicans nine to one in the primary, Harry G. Leslie owes his G. O. P. gubernatorial nomination to the combined influences of Ed Jackson, George Coffin, Alfred Hogston, Walter Bossert and Henry Marshall, declared Joseph Cravens, state senator, at a Democratic rally here Thursday night.

D. C. Stephenson, former Klan dragon, now imprisoned for life for murder, and Clyde A. Walb, former Republican state chairman, now a federal prisoner, had a hand in Leslie's election as speaker of the House of Representatives in 1925, Cravens charged despite Leslie's denial.

"If, as he says, Leslie had been elected speaker in 1925 over the combined opposition of Stephenson, Jackson and Walb, and again in 1927 over the opposition of Jackson and Walb, the fact would have been so remarkable and astounding that the papers would have been filled with accounts of it," said Cravens.

William Frazee, utility lobbyist, and D. C. Stephenson were present in the office of Lawrence Cartwright, 514 Traction building, when Leslie, after being elected speaker in 1925, repaired there and selected the house committees, Cravens charged.

"There was present there," said Cravens, "Cartwright, whom Stephenson intended to make highway director if the ripper bill became law; Stephenson himself, Clyde A.

Walb, William Frazee and four other members of this group of iron men."

Declaring Leslie was not nominated by Republicans in the primary, the veteran Democratic senator said:

"There were ten candidates for the nomination. Mr. Leslie ran fifth. A total of not quite 425,000 votes were cast for the ten candidates. Leslie's vote was 46,393, slightly more than one-ninth of that vote. Did the Republican party want him?

"All during that race, Leslie was as silent as the grave concerning the administration of Jackson, of Walb and other of their ilk, to the affairs of the Republican party."

Cravens reviewed the fate of four Republican candidates who "came out into the open and denounced the administration and the forces

of control in more or less vigorous terms."

The four, he recalled, were Frederick Landis, who got 30,000 more votes than Leslie; Thomas H. Adams, who got 20,000 more votes than Leslie; Charles W. Jewett, who led Eschbach by 11,000 votes, and Jesse Eschbach, who got within 12,000 votes as many as Leslie while making no campaign or canvass of the state.

Jackson, Schortemeier, Coffin, Hogston and Henry W. Marshall engineered Leslie's nomination, Cravens charged, "and Leslie is now and will be tied hand and foot to the men whom I have named."

Cravens drew "thumb nail character sketches" of Leslie's sponsors. He referred to Jackson as "the man whom Stephenson made Governor and who in turn sold Stephenson, for \$2,500, a spavined, knock-kneed, decrepit old horse named Senator; the man who raped

the state's penal and benevolent institutions, the man who has now on the state's pay roll as appointees, not elected officials, but his relatives; the man who was saved from prison by the statute of limitations to the everlasting shame and disgrace of the state of Indiana."

Coffin, he said, was "Stephenson's man Friday," who recently led the Elephants to hear Leslie's opening speech at Lafayette.
