

DR. REAVIS TO BE SPEAKER AT MASS MEETING

Champion of Negro Cause
to Give Address at
Y. M. C. A. Sunday.

"Danger Signals Ahead" is the subject of Dr. J. T. Reavis, of Butler university, scheduled to address a mass meeting for men only at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon at the Y. M. C. A. Senate avenue and Michigan street.

Dr. Reavis succeeds Dr. Howard E. Jensen, who as head of the department of sociology at Butler, became nationally known because of his frank and fearless expressions on questions affecting the Negro race.

Dr. Reavis has taught in South American republics and Australia during the last twenty years. His reputation is that of a forceful speaker and a fearless friend of the Negro.

Music for the meeting Sunday is to be by the Attucks High school quartet and the masonic military band. Another record is expected, say F. E. De Franz executive secretary.

She has not seen him since. Disheartened by a futile search of Toledo, the woman turned her steps east, searching morgues and charitable institutions, assisted by police and railroad conductors, and running down clues which have brought her here.

In the thirty-four years of their married life, Mrs. Walker and her husband have been transients along the highways and byways of the nation, selling bulbs and roots for a nursery company.

M'NUTT GIVES COOLIDGE
NATIONAL LEGION PLANS

Pays Call at White House to Outline
Legislative Program.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—The American Legion's national legislative program proposed at the recent San Antonio (Tex.) convention, was presented to President Coolidge by National Commander Paul McNutt of Indiana, who called at the White House today.

Major provisions of the program call for universal draft, scout construction bill, twenty amendments to laws for disabled veterans, maintenance of our naval rating under the 5-5-3 treaty and construction of 2,750 new hospital beds at a cost of \$10,000,000.

BATTLE RIDE TO DOCK EVATHAN

Spend 17 Hours Getting
Ship's Anchor Weighed.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10. — After a seventeen-hour battle with tide and wind within New York harbor, the giant liner Leviathan was docked Friday.

More than thirteen hundred fretful passengers held aboard all night because the vessel was so unmanageable it could not be slipped into the pier without crashing into it or colliding with another ship.

The Leviathan reached the pier at 9 o'clock Thursday night.

A dozen tugs, puffing at full steam, nosed her cautiously toward the dock. But the ship missed by a narrow margin, and, caught in a swift current, was swept downstream.
