NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—The recent week-end was very upsetting in the lives of a number of coaches and experts. Many of the big football games of the day resulted in what the sports writing guild calls upsets. At least they were written into the records as such.

Just what is an upset, anyway? I ought to know because I have been writing about them for years, but the truth is I don't. In many cases an upset is nothing more nor less than a forecast on a game, a race or a fight that didn't come out the way you figured it would. Like the first Dempsey-Tunney fight, for instance.

LET'S LOOK INTO THIS UPSET BUSINESS. IN THE HENGE THAT NOTRE DAME, TWICE BEATEN, FACED A POWERFUL UNBEATEN ARMY TEAM. ITS VICTORY AT THE STADIUM YESTERDAY WAS A SURPRISE ANYHOW, BUT IT WAS NOTHING MORE THAN THAT.

NOTRE DAME WAS THE BETTER TEAM SATURDAY AND BEING THE BETTER TEAM DESERVED TO WIN. HAD THE ARMY WON, THE WAY THE GAME WAS PLAYED, THEN THAT WOULD HAVE BEEN A REAL UPSET.

The Irish out-rushed, out-passed, out-tricked and out-kicked the Cadets. Except in football, this is sufficient. Mr. "Bill" Jones will tell you there are times when it is entirely too much.

MARYLAND OUGHT TO BE PERMITTED TO ACCEPT ITS FINE VICTORY WITHOUT ANY FURTHER APOLOGIES. THERE CAN BE NO UPSET WHEN A TEAM IS AS GOOD, IF NOT A SHADE BETTER, THAN ITS OPPONENT ON THE DAY OF PLAY.

These circumstances seemed to indicate a certain hard score was Penn, 7, Harvard, 0. Still it was no upset, in the sense that the reward was unjust. Most of the witnesses of the game agree Penn had the better team and played the better ball most of the way.

A TEAM THAT IS SO EQUIPPED AND USES ITS EQUIPMENT TO SUPERIOR ADVANTAGE CERTAINLY DESERVES TO WIN, AND IS ENTITLED TO ALL THE YIP-YAPPING AND HOOP-LAING THAT MERITS SUCCESS.

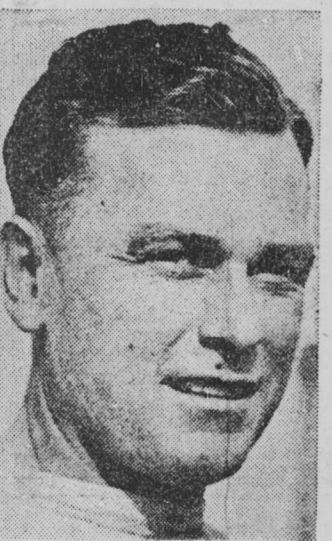

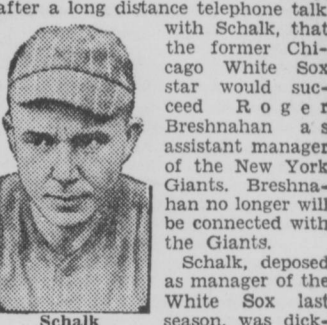
Ray Schalk Signs With N. Y. Giants
