

# KIDNAP KILLER DIES TONIGHT IN OHIO PRISON

Toledo Clubber. Negro to Be Executed at Sundown; Warden's Birthday.

OHIO STATE PENITENTIARY, COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 30.—Unless Governor Donahey intervenes, Charles Hoppe, former Toledo chauffeur, will be executed in the electric chair tonight for the murder of 7-year-old Dorothy Sczelagowski of Toledo.

Hoppe will be executed in death by John Rucker, a Cincinnati Negro, who was condemned to die for the killing of a policeman.

The state board of clemency this morning refused to recommend clemency in Hoppe's case and will report on the Rucker case this afternoon.

Hoppe's wife and his brother Leo appealed to the Governor's office this morning, but the Governor was out of the city and his executive secretary said he would abide by the clemency board's recommendations. The Sczelagowski child was kidnapped and murdered last summer; Hoppe later confessed and also admitted clubbing a Toledo school teacher to death.

Hoppe ate a hearty Thanksgiving dinner, but remained sullenly defiant. This has characterized his attitude since his arrival at Death Row.

The two men will be executed shortly after sundown under the direction of Warden P. E. Thomas. Today is Thomas' fifty-sixth birthday anniversary and will mark ninety-seven executions over which he has presided.

## GOES TO JAIL FOR HAT

General" has not lifted the ban, but has shown he approves the custom by permitting it in schools supported by his government.

## HOPEFUL FOR BRITISH-U. S. ARMS PARLEY

Britten Is Undismayed by Unofficial Criticism of Plan.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—Apparently undismayed by unofficial government criticism of his move for an Anglo-American parliamentary conference or arms limitation, Prime Minister Britten of the house naval committee predicted today calling of such a conference in view of favorable foreign press comment on the idea.

Unless the conference is called before 1931, the two governments may spend millions of dollars for needless competition in naval armaments," Britten said.

"There is no rift between England and America and there need be no military competition between these nations."

"People of both nations desire the governments to get together on a limitation against their desires must be limited. I want to do everything to prevent useless expenditures for armaments. If these two governments are real friends, let them prove it."

Britten said that, should his proposal fail, he believed the interparliamentary union group of Great Britain and the United States would discuss naval limitations at the next interparliamentary union meeting at Madrid, Spain, and then report recommendations to their governments.

## Shumaker in Durant Contest on Prohibition

Rigid law enforcement and education to shape public sentiment are needed to make the Eighteenth Amendment effective, Dr. Edward S. Shumaker, Indiana Anti-Saloon League superintendent, contends in a 1,900-word essay which he entered today in the \$25,000 W. C. Durant contest.

The Indiana dry leader was unwilling to divulge details of his solution of the prohibition problem prior to the decision of the judges, which is promised for Christmas day.

Durant, Eastern motor car magnate, a pronounced dry, some months ago offered \$25,000 for the best plan to make the Eighteenth Amendment effective. Dr. Shumaker at once indicated he would compete for the prize and was engaged on his essay when he made a brief excursion to the Indiana State Farm for contempt of the Indiana Supreme court.
