**FIGHT AGAINST
NAVY BILL IS
TO CONTINUE**

Fate of Kellogg Pact Not to
End Fight for New
Cruisers.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—Opposition to the navy cruiser construction bill, now the unfinished business in the senate, will continue, regardless of the success or failure of the Kellogg peace treaty, it was learned here today.

So far, opponents of the bill calling for construction of fifteen cruisers and an airplane carrier have confined themselves to a fight for action on the treaty ahead of the so-called big navy measure. Now they are preparing to carry on their battle even if the peace pact is ratified before the debate on the bill closes.

Prepare to Fight Bill

Senator Norris (Rep., Neb.), and other western independents, joined by a few Democrats, are prepared to fight the cruiser bill to the last.

So far as can be learned, however, none of them is planning to resort to a filibuster, and unless they can gain more recruits can it stop its passage by other means.

There is a possibility, however, that they will succeed in reducing the number of ships authorized by the bill as it passed the house at its last session. Many senators who do not oppose the naval construction program would vote for modification.

King Joins with Norris

Senator King (Dem.) Utah, who has joined Norris, in the fight for treaty priority, will introduce an amendment calling for construction of only five cruisers. He also will seek to eliminate the provision calling for completion of the fifteen-cruiser program in three years. President Coolidge in his message to congress suggested this elimination of the time-clause.

Big navy advocates contend removal of the time limit would create only a "paper navy" and proponents of the bill profess to have enough strength to retain this provision despite Coolidge's opposition.

**BOOM EUGENE MEYER
FOR POST IN CABINET**

Farm Loan Commissioner May Become Treasury Chief.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—Eugene Meyer's name is the latest to be mentioned as possible secretary of the treasury in Herbert Hoover's cabinet.

With Hoover on his way to Washington and due here in ten days speculation as to the men with whom he will surround himself in office has broken out anew.

Meyer is now federal farm loan commissioner. He was appointed to that office by President Coolidge and was confirmed by the senate after opposition from the mid-west.

He is a banker, and was born in California, though he has not lived there for many years. During the Wilson administration he served in war time on the advisory commission of the council of national defense, war industries board, national committee on war savings, and the war finance corporation.

**TRIAL OF \$1,000,000
ESTATE CASE OPENS**

Cousins of Eccentric Bachelor Appear in Court at Petersburg.

Cousins on Meredith's side of the family filed the suit contending that it was not the testator's intention to bequeath anything to cousins on his mother's side—that his purpose was to keep the estate in the Meredith family.
