"But I'm glad he can't see me now. These eyes—he probably would divorce me. But working with Lon Chaney—you'd have to have to get rigged up some funny way."

Miss Taylor pointed to her eyes, held to an oriental slant by the magic of a facial specialist. "I have to leave them that way day and night and Jack probably would go wild. I don't like them this way either and the doofunny that holds them in place hurts terribly. I couldn't stand the pain only I have to look my part on the screen."

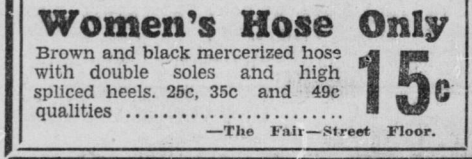

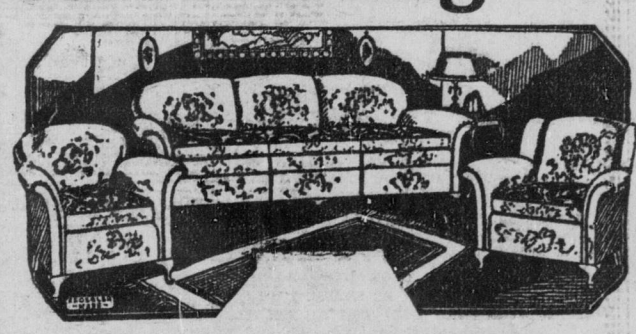
