"That silly separation business started over an airplane trip I made here from Tia Juana," Miss Taylor said. "Jack didn't want me to go up in a plane, because he was afraid I might get hurt. He drove our car home, but he didn't even have an argument over the matter."

Eyes Turn Oriental

"But I'm glad he can't see me now. These eyes he probably would divorce me. But working with Lon Chaney, you'd expect I'd have to get rigged up some funny way."

Miss Taylor pointed to her eyes, held to an oriental slant by the magic of a facial specialist.

"I have to leave them that way day and night and Jack probably would go wild. I don't like them this way either and the doofunny that holds them in place hurts terribly. I couldn't stand the pain only I have to look my part on the screen."
