

JOHN D. SR. IN FIGHT WITH SON ON STEWART Younger Man Is Doing Right in Battle, Says Father.

NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—John D. Rockefeller Sr., the 89-year-old creator of the Standard Oil Company, definitely is behind his son John D. Jr., in his fight to unseat Robert W. Stewart as head of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana.

Whether he will take active part in lining up proxies for the stockholders meeting March 7 the elder Rockefeller's statement, issued here Thursday night, did not make clear. Wall Street, however, assumed he would use his influence in that direction.

Views Fight as Moral Issue
Hitherto silent, the aged oil man indicated he viewed his son's battle as a moral issue. Himself once attacked for his methods in building up Standard Oil, he made plain that "good conscience" forced his son to oppose Stewart for dealings that brought him under senate fire.

Besides, he added, the best welfare of Indiana Standard and "large corporate interests in general" demanded Stewart's ousting.

His statement, issued at Standard Oil offices here while he was vacationing in Florida, was a direct answer to Stewart's declaration here Jan. 18 that "Mr. Rockefeller never has intimidated me that he was dissatisfied with my conduct, and I don't believe he ever will."

RECEIVER TAKES OVER MISSING MAN'S STORE

Proceedings Reveal Disappearance From Newcastle Three Weeks Ago.

NEWCASTLE, Ind., Feb. 1.—Herbert C. Miller, cigar store and pool-room proprietor, has been missing three weeks, it was revealed when Harley J. Pressnall was appointed by the Henry circuit court as receiver for Miller's business.

In some quarters it is feared Miller has been the victim of foul play, friends and business associates saying he had \$1,500 in cash and \$2,000 in bonds when he left here, presumably to go to a hospital at Rochester, Minn.

Others believe Miller may have fled the city in an effort to avoid payment of a \$1,443 debt to the Citizens Trust and Savings Company, which instituted the receivership proceedings.

Homer's "Odyssey" vies with Stevenson's "Treasure Island" for second call from immature minds. Dumas and his "Three Musketeers" have a hard battle to keep Mark Twain's "Huckleberry Finn" from a front rank.

And children still believe in fairies or Hans Andersen's tales, Aesop's Fables, Winnie-the-Pooh, Arabian Nights, The Golden Fleece and Alice's Adventures in Wonderland wouldn't need new bindings with as much frequency.

In the fictional shelves an elder one would find disappointment. Henry, and his not always accurate historical adventures, are getting dusty from disuse. The whole set isn't there. Kirk Munro with his heroic escapades among the Indians have lost their "tony" place. Horatio Alger's "bootblack-million-

aires" must have gone back to boot-blackening for a living. Captain King's war yarns lay peacefully on their shelves.

In turn Hal G. Everts "Bald Face," Ross Santee's "Cowboy," a lengthy set of books by Joseph A. Altshuler, with a wide variety of mystery and adventure novels have supplanted the old favorites in the lives of youth.

But while Lindy's "We" strums adventure's urge for boydom you'll find that same youth carrying "Robinson Crusoe" home with him as a companionate volume.

Carrie E. Scott, head of the children's library and L. L. Dickerson, librarian, aver that girls no longer care for simpering, wishy-washy tales about girlhood when they can masticate mentally "The Powder Mill Mystery," "The Tattooed Men," "Moby Dick," "Fighting Blood," and others of the same red corpuscle ilk.
