**1,920,000 WIVES
ARE EMPLOYED**

**Husband's Pay Inadequate;
Great Increase Shown.**

WASHINGTON, May 3.—Of the 8,346,796 women wage-earners in the United States 1,920,281, or one out of every four, are married, the National Home Study Council, Washington, D. C., reveals, adding that many of them are compelled to neglect their homes and children

and work for wages because their husbands are engaged in unskilled employment, which, in many cases, offers a pay scale lower than the costs of a modest living standard.

Furthermore, the council states, while the number of women wage-earners in this country has increased approximately 21 per cent since 1890, the proportion of those who are married has risen nearly 100 per cent in the same period.

Besides inadequate salaries of young married men, other vital reasons given for the marked increase in the number of wives now working for wages are the spread of industrialism, high rents, increasing costs of living expenses and the desire to elevate the status of domestic existence.
