

SAME BANDIT ROBS THREE GAS STATIONS

Holdups Occur in Two
Hours: Fisherman Loses
Tackle Packed for Trip.

Police today sought to check an epidemic of filling station holdups which broke out Thursday night when three stations were robbed, presumably by the same bandit, within two hours.

Covering Frederick Davis, 21, of 1908 Ashland avenue, attendant at the Standard Oil Company station at Michigan and Davidson streets, with a gun about 8:30 p. m., a roughly-dressed bandit took \$20 from the safe and a belt money changer, but overlooked \$60 in Davis' pocket as he forced the attendant into a washroom. The bandit walked from the station.

Less than an hour later Cecil Moncrief, 721 Fletcher avenue, attendant at a Standard station at English and State avenues, was confronted by a bandit who backed him into the washroom and escaped with \$20.

Shortly after Moncrief was held up, a bandit robbed Verl Asphers, R. R. O. Box 7, attendant at the National Refining Company station at Keystone avenue and New York street of \$40. Again the attendant was forced into a washroom.
