

FOURTH PRISON TERM ESCAPED BY DOCTOR, 84

Judge Wipes Off Illegal Operation Charge Against Aged Woman.

CHICAGO, June 20.—Dr. Lucy Hagenow, 84, four times convicted of manslaughter, when young women patients died after illegal operations, has been freed by the law to "make her peace with God."

The aged physician, whom prosecutors call the "author of a thousand deaths," has been arrested seventy-five times and has served three terms in Joliet penitentiary, always on the same charge.

Her latest conviction growing out of a stenographer's death, for which she was given a term of fourteen years, was set aside by the supreme court.

It held the prosecution failed to prove the operation was not necessary to save the girl's life.

A new trial was ordered if new evidence could be introduced.

But no new evidence could be found when Dr. Hagenow came up for trial again Wednesday. So they struck the case off the docket.

Judge Frank Comerford contemplated the bent-old figure. Dr. Hagenow is so crippled she scarcely can walk and her hearing almost is gone.

"I don't think your months on earth are many," said the judge. "Go, make your peace with God."

1 KILLED, 34 HURT IN ELEVATED CAR CRASH

Trains Telescope in Rear-End Wreck Ninety Feet Above Street.

NEW YORK, June 20.—One person was killed and thirty-four injured Wednesday night when two elevated trains crashed at eighth avenue and 112th street, the highest point on New York's elevated structures.

Ninety feet above the street a northbound Sixth avenue train rammed into the rear of a Ninth avenue train, ploughing through the last car of the latter train and causing the two cars ahead to buckle.

Edward Brennan, a guard on the Ninth avenue train, was wedged in the wreckage and acetylene torches had to be used to free him. He died soon afterward.

AWARD CONTRACTS TO PAVE AND GRADE ROADS

State Highways 39 and 50 Will Be Improved.

Hodgkins & Adams Company, Winchester, Ky., was given a contract Thursday by the state highway commission for the grading and construction of small structures on State Road 50, 2.8 miles from Versailles, west of Elrod. Contract price was \$132,602.64.

MIX LOSES \$79,100

Movie Star's Valet Held in Alleged Theft.

The report made to police on Mix's behalf said the cash and securities were contained in a leather bag stolen from the movie actor's berth in his private car of the circus train.

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WAR BIRD TO GET MEMORIAL

Army Will Commemorate Hero Pigeon's Deed.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—The army is going to do what it can to perpetuate the memory of a battered homing pigeon which one day in November, 1918, fluttered to its loft at Rampont, France, minus a leg and with a bullet wound in its breast. A scribbled message from the front was intact.

Because of this and other exploits, the pigeon was named President Wilson. It has just died at Ft. Monmouth, N. J., aged eleven years, after being retired from active service after the war. The bird was bred in France of unknown pedigree, but its record is that of a thoroughbred.

First with the tanks and later at St. Mihiel and in the Meuse-Argonne, the bird was in regular service. Its final exploit was the flight to Rampont from Grand Pre, twenty-five miles, which was made in exactly twenty-five minutes. The message from Grand Pre was hanging to the ligaments of the bird's legs when it arrived.

The bird is to be stuffed and mounted beneath its pedestal in the Ft. Monmouth museum. A placard will recount the exploits that made it famous.

Miss McAvoy gave her age as 25 and Cleary his as 31 when they applied for their license.




