

LETCHER HAS LITTLE CHANCE TO BE SENATOR

Discount Reports He Quit as Ambassador to Seek Office.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—Reports to-day P. Fletcher, American ambassador to Italy, has resigned to seek the United States senatorship from his home state of Pennsylvania, are not taken seriously in political circles.

Fletcher, it is understood, would like to sit in the senate, but he appreciates the difficulties.

Three obstacles are in his way all informed politicians point out.

First, there is no senatorial vacancy from Pennsylvania and he is not likely to be until the Senate acts definitely on the case of Senator-Elect William S. Vare, who never has been admitted. The Vare case will not be decided until Fall, if then, and when it is his immediate successor will be named by Governor Fisher.

Second, Fletcher's home is at Greencastle, which is in the southwestern part of the state, near the Maryland line. It always has been the custom in Pennsylvania to have senators from the eastern and from the western section of the state.

Senator David A. Reed comes from Pittsburgh, in the west, and Senator-Elect Vare from Philadelphia, in the east.

Vare's successor, if and when he is appointed or elected, is likely to come from Philadelphia, or nearby.

Third, Ambassador Fletcher has been in the diplomatic service for twenty-seven years and become a career man.

During these years he has gotten out of touch with the Pennsylvania political organization and insofar as the present leaders are concerned, he is a stranger. He is even more of a stranger to the rank and file of Pennsylvania voters.

The real reason for Fletcher's resignation, many believe, is disappointment because he has gotten no promotion from President Herbert Hoover and none is in sight.

Fletcher, who went to South America with Hoover in an advisory capacity, wanted to be secretary of state, it is said.

Next he wanted to go as ambassador either to London or to Paris.

The immediate outlook for Fletcher was an indefinite stay in Rome where he already has been the ambassador for five years.

U. S. SURPLUS MAY NOT BRING SLASH IN TAXES

Members of Senate Finance Committee Pessimistic Over Reduction.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—Although the \$185,000,000 treasury surplus at the end of the fiscal year far exceeded expectations, members of the Senate Finance Committee were pessimistic today over prospects of another tax reduction.

Chairman Reed Smoot said tax reduction within the near future is out of the question.

Democratic members of the committee, who usually clamor for a reduction in taxes whenever the treasury shows a surplus, were wary of suggesting such a move at this time.

They pointed to the huge obligations upon the federal treasury as a result of the farm relief flood control and naval building programs.

Several also expressed doubt that the abnormally large receipts from income taxes would continue during the new year.
