

FINAL TRIBUTE TO L. B. SWIFT SET FOR TODAY

Friends Will Honor Civic Leader at Simple Burial Rites.

With brief, simple tributes from his most intimate friends, funeral services will be held this afternoon at 4 for Lucius B. Swift, 85, civil reform leader, Civil war veteran and attorney, who died Wednesday afternoon at his home, 716 East Fourteenth street.

At services at the home, Evans Woolen and Hilton U. Brown of Indianapolis and William Dudley Foulke of Richmond, will speak of Mr. Swift's earnest devotion to civil service reform which won him national eminence. Foulke will read Edward Rowan Sill's poem "The Reformer."

The services will be closed by the sounding of taps by a bugler from Lt. Benjamin Harrison, after which the body will be cremated at the Planner & Buchanan mortuary, 25 West Fall Creek drive.

At the crematory service, S. V. Norton, Mr. Swift's brother-in-law; Cecil K. Calvert, Joseph Daniels and Lewis Swift of Rochester, a nephew, will take charge of the body.

From leaders in civic and political circles of the state and from men prominent in the national civil service movement today came expressions of sorrow upon Mr. Swift's death and the highest tributes to his character and accomplishments.

W. G. STEWART FUNERAL TO BE HELD SATURDAY

Railroad Man and Prominent Lodge Member Dies.

Funeral services for William G. Stewart, who died Wednesday night at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Julia Hendrix, 2228 Madison avenue, will be held at residence, 50 Whittier place, at 2 p. m. Saturday. Burial will be in Crown Hill cemetery.

Mr. Stewart, who has lived in Indianapolis all his life, was employed by the Illinois Central railway until 1918, when he was forced out of the service by injury. He was also an employee of the Indianapolis Union railway.

He was a member of the Mystic Tie Lodge, F. & A. M., Scottish Rite, Murat Shrine, Knights of Pythias and the B. of R. T.

Survivors are six sons, Ezra H. Stewart, H. L. Stewart, E. F. Stewart, H. F. Stewart, Cornell J. Stewart and William A. Stewart; four daughters, Mrs. Hendrix, Mrs. Anna Crow, Mrs. Nellie E. Wilcox and Mrs. Mabel Hayes, all of Indianapolis.

BOARD ADOPTS NEW PAVING RESOLUTIONS

Action Taken to Settle Legality of Delaware Widening.

Resolutions have been adopted by the board of public works for the paving of York street from Drexel street to Kentucky avenue, paving of Drexel street from the south property line of White River parkway to north right of way of the Belt railroad and the resurfacing and widening of Delaware street from Massachusetts avenue to Ft. Wayne avenue.

Total cost of the improvements is to be \$82,209.28. Delaware is to be given a three-inch asphalt resurfacing. New resolutions were drawn because of threatened litigation on a resolution drawn up some time ago because of failure to provide for the filling in and walling up of basements following the widening.

HUNDREDS WORSHIP AT NEW 'MIRACLE' SHRINE

Profess to See Outline of Virgin and Christ's Head on Wall.

NORTH BERGEN, N. J., July 5.—Hundreds knelt at a new shrine over Independence day as devout persons professed to see an outline of the Virgin appear beside the silhouette of the head of Christ on the wall of the New York and New Jersey mausoleum.

Many persons were keeping vigil before the stone wall where two large blottches have appeared, one resembling a woman in a nun's costume with her hands crossed on her breast and the other having the semblance of the outline of a male head.

Mrs. Maria Tarantella, 72, has not left the scene for seventy-two hours and several persons joined her in prayers Thursday.

\$50 in Merchant Is Taken; Rob Paint Shop of \$86.


