

HOOVER SNUBS 'HURT' MELLON; MAY QUIT POST

Treasury Secretary Said to
Feel Keenly Sights on
Various Questions.

WASHINGTON, July 5.—As a result of several snubs administered to Andrew J. Mellon, secretary of treasury by President Herbert Hoover in major matters, reports were current there today that Mellon would retire soon after the Senate had ratified that portion of the Young reparations plan which affects the United States. Similar reports from time to time have been denied.

Mellon is said to feel keenly the sights he has suffered since March 4, in questions dealing with tax reduction, payment of the French \$400,000,000 debt, prohibition problems and patronage.

Hoover has demonstrated rather pointedly that the holdover secretary of the treasury no longer is the dominant figure he was during the Harding and Coolidge regimes.

Though Mellon has not discussed his relations with the White House, his friends intimate that he recognizes the loss of power and prestige his altered status has brought.

OCEAN Fliers EXHAUSTED BY MANY FETES

Frenzied Welcome for
'Lost' Spaniards and Rescuers Continues.

MADRID, July 5.—The frenzied rejoicing at the safe return of the four Spanish fliers, who arrived here accompanied by the officers of the British ship that rescued them from the Atlantic, continued at the same tumultuous pitch today, with the government and the populace seeking new ways of honoring them.

From every city and town in Spain new invitations came imploring the fliers and the officers of H. M. S. Eagle to honor it with a visit.

The British officers were scheduled to leave for Seville today at 1897.

The fliers were tired almost to a point of exhaustion, with the ordeal they had gone through on the open sea for seven days and nights and the constant entertainments they have attended since they arrived on land.

They were received by the queen, who congratulated them and thanked their rescuers not only for saving Spain's favorite fliers, but also for strengthening the relations between that country and Great Britain.

Lieutenant Kilroy, the Britisher who was first to sight the drifting plane near the Azores, and Major Gallarza, one of the four lost fliers, seemed to be the favorites with the señoritas, who gave their kisses with remarkable frequency.

Gallarza and Kilroy have received so many of these favors that they have grown weary of them, for the excellent reason, in Gallarza's words that "they are not all pretty."
