

LOWMAN BACKS U. S. OFFICER IN DRY KILLINGS

Oklahoma Shooting Done by Civilian, Prohibition Chief Points Out.

WASHINGTON, July 9.—Charges against W. W. Thomason, prohibition officer, accused as an accessory in the fatal shooting last week of James Harris and Oscar Lowery, Oklahoma farmers, will not be pressed, in the opinion of Seymour Lowman, assistant treasury secretary, it was learned today.

Pointing out the shooting was done by Jeff Harris, a civilian who accompanied Thomason on the raid, Lowman said he did not believe Thomason could be held responsible for the killing.

The raid on the Harris farm, Lowman said, was made at the request of local authorities who suspected the farmer of bootlegging.

A report on the incident is expected here later this week. The shooting was the fourth, in recent weeks in which federal customs or prohibition officials have been involved.

Lowman has absolved all treasury officers implicated in the various shootings.

KING'S HEALTH ALARMS
BRITISH NATION AGAIN

His Majesty to Undergo X-Ray, but Doctors Discount Fears.

LONDON, July 9.—Despite reassurances from King George's physicians and medical experts of the nation that the state of his health gave no cause for alarm, the British people remained apprehensive today for his welfare.

News that the sinus in his right chest had not progressed satisfactorily and would be X-rayed was disconcerting to the British people, who had cheered him as a well man at Sunday's thanksgiving services.

The king's physicians, supported by medical experts on various London newspapers, pointed out that the X-rays were a thing to be expected, and that the postponement of the departure for Sandringham cottage was only temporary and not caused by any serious ailment.

OFFICIALS ROW ON DRY ARREST

Omaha Police, U. S. Agents at Odds on Rich Prisoner.

OMAHA, July 9.—A heated controversy between federal agents and Omaha police has developed over the arrest by government dry agents of Harry B. Zinman, former city commissioner and treasurer of one of the city's leading department stores.

"It seems to be the rule," asserted Alex Brungardt, city prosecutor, as he filed technical charges of illegal possession of liquor against Zinman, "that when the government has a flimsy case it is shoved off

on to the city for trial in police court."

"It's a police court case," said General W. McD. Rowan, federal prohibition administrator.

A bottle of alcohol was found in Zinman's possession.

He contended he merely was delivering it to a sick friend at the request of another friend.

Body of John R. Foster to Be Cremated.

Funeral rites for John R. Foster, a retired naval officer who died Monday at his residence, 3531 Kenwood avenue, will be held at 4 p. m. Wednesday at the Flanner & Buchanan mortuary. The body will be cremated.

Mr. Foster's death followed a three-year illness.

He was born in Charlottesville, Va., the son of General James R. Foster of the Confederate army. After graduating from the United States naval academy at Annapolis, Mr. Foster was shipwrecked off the Australian coast. He rescued the

captain of the ship from drowning and was promoted to a captaincy. Survivors are the widow and a brother, Stephen Foster of Virginia.

BIRCH ROD OPPOSED BY BRITISH MAGISTRATES

Judge Says Most Boys Come Back to Courts Again After Whippings.

LONDON, July 9.—Youthful lawbreakers in England no longer will have to fear the birch rod if a movement of magistrates to abolish

corporal punishment for young offenders is successful.

W. Clarke Hall, London police court judge, explained his opposition to the widespread practice of "birching" at a conference of seventy judges and presented a report showing that 80 per cent of the boys who had been whipped in a certain court came back again charged with similar offenses.


