

## STATE HIGHWAY BRIDGES OPEN; CLOSE DETOURS

Cheering News Is Given to  
Motorists in Brown's  
Weekly Bulletin.

Several new bridges went into use on state roads this week, eliminating detours, according to the traffic bulletin issued today from the office of Director John J. Brown of the state highway department.

The bulletin called attention to a seven-mile detour on U. S. Road 30, between 29 and six miles west, now eliminated, the state paying going into use with a bridge completed.

A three-mile detour was removed on 46, east of Columbus, and a new bridge going into use on 2 eliminated a six-mile detour between the Illinois line and U. S. 41, where traffic is congested.

General road conditions were listed as follows:

Road 3—Detour from Mt. Summit to one mile south of Munroe is 16 miles. Detour from Newark to 10½ miles north to eight miles. Detour from Fiat north to Patterson is eight miles. Run-around one-half mile north of Reidsburg.

Road 2—Run-around three miles north of Huntington. Detour from Merriam to Albion is 12 miles and will change as work progresses.

Detour of Five Miles

U. S. Road 24—Detour from Illinois-Indiana line to junction with 41 is 5½ miles. Detour from Goodland to one mile east of Remington is 10½ miles. Pavement from Monticello 14 miles east, then detour one-half mile north to old route to Logansport. Detour from three miles east of Largo is three miles. Run-around east of Huntington will complete paving to meet state road, is one-half mile.

Road 29—Detour from Osgood to Junction of 46 and 29 is 20½ miles. Grading east of Greensburg. Detour from Greensburg to Shelbyville is 29 miles, fair condition. Detour from intersection of 28 to Michiganian is six miles, subject to change. Detour from one mile south of Middlefork to one mile north of Middlefork is 10 miles. Detour from Winmar to three miles south of Kossuth is 21 miles. Detour from four miles south of LaPorte to south corporation line is nine miles. Detour from one mile north of LaPorte to Michigan City is eight miles.

Road 34—Detour in Crawfordsville is 1½ miles. Detour west of New Ross is one mile. Leads are Limited.

Road 36—Detour in Rockville. Five-ton load limit on temporary bridge. Detour from junction of 36 and 20 to 1½ miles east is 2½ miles.

Road 37—Detour from four miles south of Bloomington to Bedford is 28½ miles. Good surface, but narrow, and has many sharp turns.

Road 38—Detour 4½ miles west of Richmont is 5½ miles over narrow road.

U. S. Road 40—One-way traffic around patching gap between Cumberland and Greenfield.

U. S. Road 52—Detour from eight miles west of Metamora to Brookville is 18½ miles. Part of detour over Road 1 through Rockville 1 to Connerville then 44 to Rushville.

Road 67—Detour in Spencer over city streets. Detour from five miles northeast of Munroe is 2½ miles west of Albany is three miles. Detour from Albany to Portland is 2½ miles. Roads not mentioned, and parts of roads mentioned, but not specified, and all detours not otherwise described, are in good condition.
