

OFFICIALS RAP NEW DETENTION SITE PLANS

Snider, Board President,
Wants Modern Building
for County Home.

An inkling of the reported strife among county commissioners over selection of a site for the county's new detention home and juvenile court, trickled out today when George Snider, board president, said he would refuse to approve anything but a new building.

Reports have been current that Commissioner John Shearer stands in favor of the site at the northwest corner of North and Alabama streets which commissioners originally intended to purchase. That was several weeks ago and since then the council has appropriated \$100,000 for purchase of ground while commissioners have before them thirty-two sites, with no indication of an early selection forthcoming.

"I will not under any circumstances, approve remodeling of any present structure as the new detention home and juvenile court," Snider declared. "The taxpayers expect a new building which will be properly equipped and would strike the detention home problem off public records for years to come. I shall stand on this idea as long as I am commissioner and if a new building is not erected there, as far as I'm concerned, the situation will remain as it is today."

Plymouth Voyage Promises to Set
New Mark.

NEW YORK, July 31.—The Bremen, world's fastest passenger liner, is expected to arrive at 9 tonight at Plymouth, England.

SOLOM IS APPOINTED

Claycombe Named by Leslie as Bureau Head.

Having accepted resignations from two legislators appointed as license revocation judges, Secretary of State Otto G. Fife today appointed another legislator to the position as chief and counsel of the bureau of criminal identification and registration.

The latest legislative beneficiary is Lloyd D. Claycombe, Indianapolis, who gained fame in the lower house of the legislature during the 1929 session by trying to thwart action against the city manager law. He is a political henchman of George V. Coffin, local political boss.

Fife is friendly with the Coffin crowd, which plays politics after the manner of Lake county, where the secretary of state comes from.

The position given Claycombe was formerly held by John K. Buckels-

haus, who resigned to accept a position on the legal staff of the Ulen Company, Lebanon. He is now in Europe.

The position is part time and pays \$1,500 a year.

JURY ANSWERS GIRLS' PRAYERS BY ACQUITTAL

Spend Six Hours on Knees
to Thwart Charges of
Burglary.

CHICAGO, July 31.—Two girls whom the state sought to send to prison for from one year to life believe more than ever today in the efficacy of prayer.

For six hours a jury trying Mrs. Helen Whittaker, 20, mother of an 18-month-old baby, and her friend, Florence Trainor, 19, on burglary charges, deliberated the question of their guilt or innocence.

For six hours Mrs. Whittaker and Miss Trainor remained on their knees in prayer.

When finally the jury filed back into Judge Harry B. Miller's court, its verdict was:

"Not guilty!"

Today the girls, back in their cells in Cook county jail awaiting the state's decision as to whether they would be brought to trial on other indictments pending against them, were offering up prayers of thanksgiving.

Mrs. Whittaker and Miss Trainor are accused of several apartment burglaries. The prosecution charges them with stealing jewelry, clothing and fur coats after gaining entrance to south side flats with pass keys, on the pretext of desiring to rent apartments.

The state contends it was a desire for pretty clothes and jewels that led them to it. The girls still protest their innocence.

Assistant State's Attorney George Lavin asked the jury to give them the maximum—a year to life in the women's penitentiary at Joliet.

"I'm as sorry for the girls as you are," he told the jurors, "but if you don't give them the maximum penalty you will not be doing your duty."

Two more burglary charges still are pending against the two.

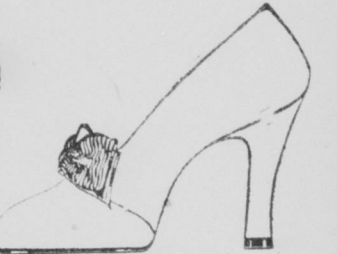
