

## SUIT ON SEVEN INCH STRIP OF LAND IS FILED

Narrow Lane of Property on Pennsylvania Street Forces Action.

Court action over a seven-inch strip of downtown property was awaited today after suit was filed in circuit court by the Adoniram Grand Lodge of Perfection, Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, Thursday afternoon, seeking to quiet title to real estate at 29-37 South Pennsylvania street.

The suit alleged the site of a seven-inch wall between the Rite structure and the majestic building belongs to the former organization after it purchased the site north of the majestic building from the Indianapolis Gas Company in 1895. The Scottish Rite occupied its eight-story building on the South Pennsylvania street site until a few weeks ago. The purpose of the litigation is to clear up ownership of the property should the order decide to sell the land.

W. T. Cannon, president of the Railroad men association, declared a mistake had been made either in the deed record to the property in 1873 or when the lodge purchased its property twenty-two years later.
