

NINE KILLED AS VIOLENCE TOLL

Traffic Accidents Cause Most of Indiana Deaths.

Nine persons are dead in Indiana today, victims of violence over the week-end. Most of the fatalities were caused by automobile accidents. There was one slaying.

Melvin Yokum, 35, was fatally hurt during a fight with Ralph Broglin, 35, who had been broken by a flat blow.

Traffic accidents took a toll of four lives in the Calumet district and elsewhere in northern Indiana. Mr. and Mrs. L. Cheney, Chicago, were killed when their automobile was struck by a train. Max

Larence, 32, Gary, was killed when he drove his motorcycle against a speeding Grand Trunk limited train.

Herman Tarnow, 50, Nickel Plate railroad section hand, was killed near Valparaiso when struck by a Grand Trunk passenger train.

Mrs. Charles Pontius, 60, of Wolcottville, was killed when struck by an automobile in front of her home.

A. O. Gaine, 71, of Bedford, was injured fatally when struck by an automobile driven by Ralph Fields.

John C. Cook, 67, of New Castle, died of injuries suffered when he fell from the second story of a school building, where he was washing windows.

C. W. Fry, 23, Piqua, O., was killed at Funk's speedway, west of Winchester, when the car he was driving in a race crashed through retaining rails.

DES MOINES SCHOOL IS CLOSED BY BOARD

University of Riot Fame in Wrong Location, Trustees Say.

DES MOINES, Sept. 2.—The egg and rock riot of the students of Des Moines university, last May was climaxed today by the announcement of the board of trustees that the institution would be discontinued.

"The trustees have concluded," said a part of the board's statement, said, "that if a Christian university is to be established and maintained, it must be done somewhere else than in Des Moines."

Special reference was made to a district court injunction which prevented the board from interfering with management of the school. The injunction was issued following the student riot when the board sought to dismiss the school faculty.

During the riot, eggs and rocks were tossed freely, and the trustees refused to issue any diplomas pending a complete investigation. The faculty, however, granted sixty diplomas at the June graduation exercises.

Probe Started of Death Caused by Fist Fight

Single Blow Results in Broken Neck for Beech Grove Man.

Members of the sheriff's office and Deputy Coroner O. H. Bakemier today were probing the fist fight which resulted in the death Sunday of Melvin (Red) Yokum, 35, refuse collector, of Beech Grove, Ind.

Yokum's neck was broken following a fight with Ralph Broglin, 31, Rural Route A, Box 62, Acton, Ind., near Thirteenth street and Bethel avenue, in Beech Grove.

Broglin is held in the county jail on a murder charge.

Yokum, in an alleged intoxicated condition, accompanied by Broglin, Robert Driskill, 26, of 72 South Seventh street, and Charles Pace, 27, of 66 South Fifth avenue, both of Beech Grove, started for Mohawk, Ind., in an auto to see a baseball game, deputies were told.

Yokum is said to have threatened to whip Driskill as well as Broglin before the trip began.

The car broke down near Thirteenth street and Bethel avenue in Beech Grove. Driskill, Yokum and Broglin started toward a garage to obtain aid. On the way Yokum is said to have turned on Broglin, saying, "I'm going to beat you up."

"I don't think you're big enough, Red," retorted Broglin.

Angered by the remark, Yokum struck Broglin in the mouth. Broglin retaliated with a smash to Yokum's head. The force of the blow knocked Yokum to the pavement. His death was almost instantaneous, the coroner said.

His body was sent to city morgue. Yokum had been rooming at 244 South Third street in Beech Grove. He formerly lived in Harriman, Tenn. He is a knitter for the Real Silk hosiery mills.
