

NAVAL PARLEY MAY CONSIST OF 3 POWERS

France, Italy Still Firm in Dispute Over Naval Strength.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—Whether the forthcoming naval conference is to consist of representatives of three or five powers probably will be known to President Hoover and Premier MacDonald before the latter returns to London. The premier today is at sea aboard the Berengaria and is due here Friday.

A fortnight ago, Secretary of State Stimson revealed general terms of the naval understanding reached by the United States and Great Britain, after a summer of negotiations. They had failed to agree upon material reduction of cruiser tonnage.

A subsequent London announcement indicated the United States planned slightly to increase instead of to reduce its present cruiser program. The currently authorized American construction would amount to fifteen additional cruisers.

Indorse Sub Abolition

London and Washington were agreed, however, upon substantial reduction of destroyer tonnage. Both sides indorsed abolition of submarines as desirable, although it is acknowledged in Washington and London that abolition is impossible at this time.

Anglo-American naval questions are not adjusted finally. The American cruiser tonnage will be fixed somewhere between 285,000 and 315,000. Great Britain will possess about 340,000 tons of cruisers.

The tonnage disparity is to be equalized by allotting the United States three to five more large 10,000-ton cruisers than Great Britain. But this near approach to agreement was sufficient to enable the calling of a five-power conference.

France, Italy and Japan, with the United States and Great Britain, comprise the world's major naval powers. Satisfactory adjustment of the world's naval problem can be had only if all five powers participate in the adjustment and bind themselves by the result.

Attitudes Are Important

Since announcement of an Anglo-American understanding, the attitudes of France and Italy have become of primary importance.

Japan will request a ratio of 7 to 10, instead of 3 to 5 in the cruiser class.

France and Italy have not indicated their requirements beyond the former's refusal to acknowledge Italian claims to parity and the latter's refusal to approve French demands for superior naval strength. The next step in the Hoover-MacDonald program is to obtain whole-hearted Italian and French co-operation in the conference projected for next January.

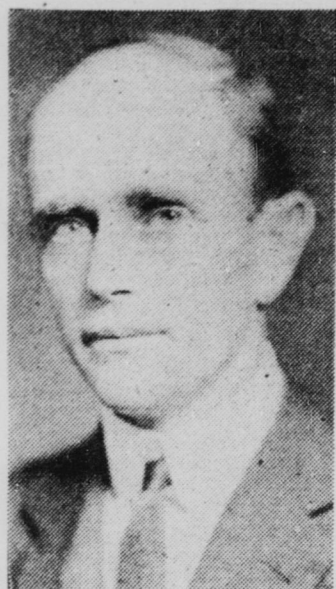
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New Judge

NEW RELIGION REVERSES ALL CHURCH TENETS

Dr. Potter Outlines Beliefs of Creed With 'Ten Commandments.'

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—A new religion, designed to teach people "how to get along with one another," has risen here.

The founder, Dr. Charles Francis Potter, calls it humanism. He stood on the platform at Steinway hall Sunday and enunciated what might be called the ten commandments of his creed. All of the 300 chairs in the building were occupied and 400 persons surged outside in an attempt to hear Potter.

He began by abolishing prayer and followed with an outline of his creed that virtually reversed every tenet of existing religions. According to Potter:

1. God did not create the earth. It is the result of evolution. 2. The conventional conception of heaven and hell is wrong because right deeds bring their own satisfaction and wrong deeds are their own retribution.

3. Man's chief aim should be to improve himself, not to glorify God. 4. Religion should deal with natural instead of super-natural.

5. Man is born inherently good and of infinite possibilities, as opposed to the theory he is inherently evil and a worm of the dust.

6. Man should attempt to remove injustice and suffering, instead of submitting to them as manifestations of the will of God. 7. There is truth in all religions and truth outside religion.

8. The ideas of sin, salvation, redemption and prayer are unimportant. 9. No man or God can save another man, for improvement comes only from within.

10. Suffering is the natural result of breaking the laws of right living. Instead of being a manifestation of hell on earth.

A drastic revision of the marriage ceremony is proposed, with couples encouraged to formulate their own ceremony. Women will not be "given away" because women are persons of their own right and not property to be given away. The word "obey" will be omitted; if rings are used, a double-ring ceremony will indicate the equality of the sexes.

The Humanist Society will object to divorce, but will seek to reduce the divorce rate by preparing people for marriage.

GASTONIA TRIAL STARTED; STATE WEAKENS CASES

Reduce Charges Against 13 Alleged Murderers to Second-Degree.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., Sept. 30.—General reduction of charges against thirteen of the sixteen defendants accused of responsibility for the killing of Chief of Police O. F. Aderholt of Gastonia, during textile strike disorders, marked the opening of court today.

Solicitor John G. Carpenter announced as court opened that the

state would try the thirteen men defendants for second degree murder instead of first degree.

He then moved that the cases of the same defendants accused also of assault with intent to kill T. A. Gilbert, A. J. Roach, and C. A. Ferguson, who were wounded when Aderholt was killed, be consolidated in this trial.

"This is a surprise," announced Frank Flowers, chief defense counsel, and the court permitted the defense attorneys to retire for a conference.

Only a handful of spectators was in the large, brown paneled chamber when court opened. Seats for the sixteen defendants were arranged in row just inside the rail.
