

BUSINESS GAIN FORECAST FOR AUTO INDUSTRY

28 Per Cent Increase Due, Shippers' Convention Is Told.

Twenty-eight per cent increase in the automobile industry and 7 per cent in general business lines for the next three months was forecast for Indiana and the Ohio valley today by shippers attending the twenty-third annual meeting of the Ohio Valley Shippers' Advisory Board in the Claypool.

J. G. Young, traffic manager of the Chamber of Commerce of Columbus, O., in giving a resume of the shippers and railroad reports, said, "the farmers in this territory are going into the winter months in a much improved condition."

Expresses Optimism

He expressed optimism for the motorcar manufacturers by citing the 28 per cent increased business forecast for October, November and December over the same quarter in 1928.

"Continued activities in construction work, and increase in coal loading have helped those two industries," he asserted.

"The iron and steel mills have an outlook of a 10 per cent increase in business for the ensuing quarter over 1928."

In explaining banking conditions in the Ohio valley he cited the following from the committee's report: "Taking the country as a whole, authorities are agreed that no slackening in business in banking circles is expected for the closing quarter."

Shipments Increase

Increase in coal, coke, ore and merchandise loading is given as the reason for the railroad reports forecasting loading during the next three months, Young said.

"Railroad representatives I have interviewed are optimistic for the year's closing months," he said.

Approximately 600 shippers, producers and traffic men attended the sessions today.


A luncheon was held in the Riley room, followed by a golf tourney on the Speedway course.

Dillon Faces Second Suit Charging Gambling Losses

Leslie Hesler Asks \$772.50 From Alleged Operator of Dice Games.

Suit to recover \$772.50, he alleges he lost recently in "craps" games at 111 West Maryland street, has been filed in superior court five by Leslie Hesler. Thomas Dillon, alleged professional gambler, was named defendant.

Hesler's suit is the second action brought against Dillon for the recovery of alleged gaming funds. Charles E. Geiger, 1541 Bursdal Parkway, filed suit to recover \$1,500 on Sept. 13.

Dillon was fined \$100 and given a suspended sentence of thirty days when tried in criminal court April 3 on a keeping a gaming house charge.

Dillon's poolroom also is the place where Grant Hart, youthful bank teller, said he lost \$1,900, which he

embezzled from a bank. Hart is serving a two-to-fourteen-year sentence at the Indiana reformatory for the offense.
