

# DRYS BEATEN IN NOVA SCOTIA BY 25,000 VOTES

Province Goes on Record Against Prohibition in Election.

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 1.—The province of Nova Scotia has gone on record against prohibition and in favor of government control of liquor sales.

With only a few precincts yet to report, it was apparent today that residents of the province had given a majority of approximately 25,000 votes to the proposal for the return of liquor on a basis similar to that approved in Ontario Wednesday.

Ten years ago prohibition carried Nova Scotia by 57,000 votes.

Voters registered their opinions on a simple referendum which called for support either of retention of the provincial temperance act or the sale of liquor under government control.

The city of Halifax returned a 10,000 majority for government control, a ratio of five to one.

The campaign was waged warmly on both sides, but prohibitionists admitted defeat after the first returns came in Thursday night. The result of the Nova Scotia balloting leaves Prince Edward Island the only Canadian province maintaining prohibition.

Hallam, in a suit filed at Miami, Okla. He alleges cruelty. Mrs. Hallam's wealth is estimated at close to \$500,000 in cash and includes vast holdings in zinc and lead mining properties.

## COMMISSION PICKED

Galveston Head Is Chairman of School Body.

# COLLEGE HEAD ATTACKED FOR 'HERETIC' IDEAS

Princeton President's Talk Disputes Bible Creed, Professor Asserts.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 1.—A suggestion that he felt Dr. John Grier Hibben, president of Princeton university, might be heretical, was voiced by Professor Robert Dick Wilson, former professor in the Princeton theological seminary, as quoted today by the Philadelphia Record.

Professor Wilson resigned from Princeton seminary to identify him-

self with the newly organized Westminster theological seminary of Philadelphia as a protest against alleged modernistic tendencies of the seminary. His charges against Dr. Hibben were called forth by the Princeton president's speech before the centennial celebration of the Presbyterian theological seminary at Chicago two days ago.

"Dr. Hibben quotes the Scripture when it pleases," Professor Wilson was quoted as saying, "but even the devil did that."

"If every one is to make his own god, then the very idea of God is destroyed. God wouldn't have any power in his own universe. We get our idea of God from the scriptures—President Hibben said man created his own god. He attacks the beliefs not only of the Presbyterian church, but of all Trinitarian churches, whether Catholic or Protestant."

"Is he a heretic? The answer is: Are the others to be called heretics or Dr. Hibben? If he concerns all the other churches, then he is orthodox, for all churches are against

him. He is wrong as far as all creeds believe today. "Dr. Hibben takes issue with the Apostle Paul. He is against the teaching of scripture. I prefer to follow Paul and the Bible."

## REPORTERS GIVE BOND

Three Sentenced for Contempt of Court Are Released.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—Three Washington Times reporters, sentenced to forty-five days in jail for contempt of court, were at liberty today under bonds of \$500 each, after little more than twenty-four hours' confinement.

The three, Gorman Hendricks, Jack Nevin and Linton Burkett, were admitted to bond by Justice Frederick Siddons of the District supreme court, after they had been adjudged in contempt Wednesday for refusing to divulge information they obtained regarding Washington saloons. Justice Peyton Gordon previously had denied them bond.

## MOVIE ACTOR DIES

Body of Norman Trevor Lies in Insane Hospital.

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., Nov. 1.—Norman Trevor, 51, who gained fame as a movie star and Olympic athlete, died in poverty Thursday at the Norwalk hospital for the insane, it was learned here today.

Trevor was a member of the British Olympic team a decade ago. Later he came to Hollywood and played important roles in "Sorrel and Son" and "Beau Geste."

Insanity proceedings were started against Trevor in 1928 by H. B. Warner, actor and close friend, who told how he had written checks for several thousand dollars without funds.

The body was held at the hospital pending instructions from a daughter, Doris Trevor of New York.

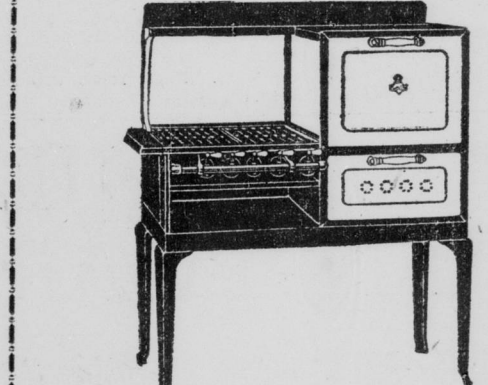

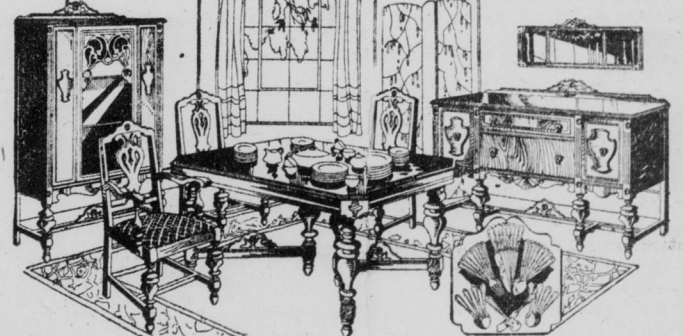

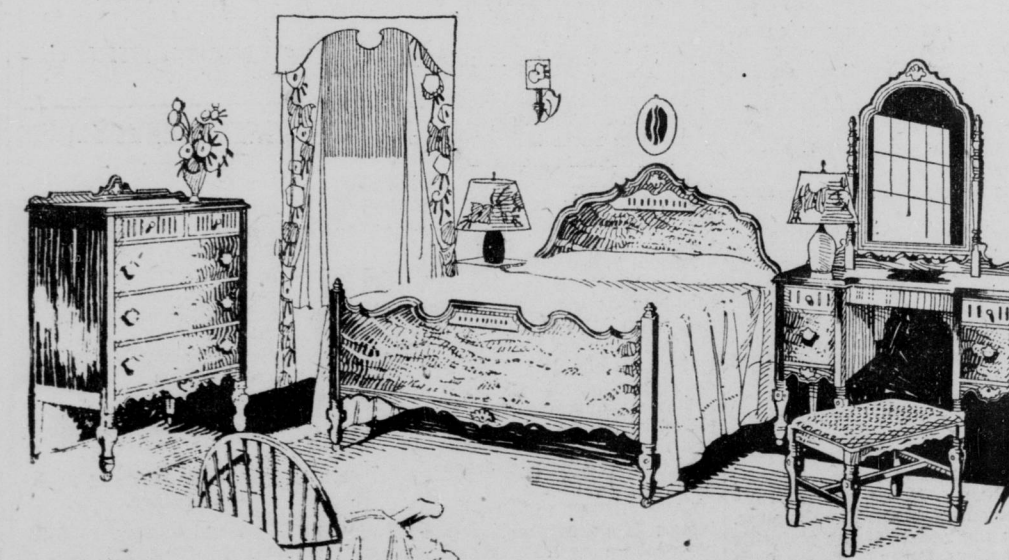
