

CHURCHES ARE URGED TO LEAD PEACE EFFORT

City Ministers Point Out
Needs in Armistice
Day Sermons.

Peace, not so much the biblical kind, "which surpasseth understanding," as a practical brand based on the Kellogg peace pact, was the keynote of Armistice sermons in various Protestant churches Sunday.

Throughout the city congregations were urged to become "peace minded" and aid in creation of public opinion backing peace policies under the leadership of President Hoover.

"Every Armistice day celebration, if true to the spirit of 1918, will sound the loud note of peace," the Rev. William P. Rothenburger, pastor of Third Christian church declared.

"Any suggestion, which directly or indirectly, helps to keep alive the war spirit or to perpetuate a war vocabulary is wholly out of harmony with Armistice day and with the highest patriotism."

"Since war has been outlawed there is need for reappraisal of our patriotism."

The Rev. Charles N. Franklin, in a sermon at Irvington M. E. church, cited scriptural passages concerning peace and pointed out that to engage in peace promotion "we are following a Divine commission."

"To be a peacemaker," he continued, "calls for active aggression rather than passive resistance; an offensive as well as a defensive course of action. It is the distinct task of the Christian to put forth the same effort to outlaw strife, as is put forth by those promoting the

measures which lead to strife and conflict, or make strife and conflict easy."

Urges Peace Efforts

"The Will to Peace" was the subject of the second of the Rev. L. C. Minsterman, pastor of the Trinity Reformed church. Pointing out that, in the modern world, all nations are neighbors, he urged peace be promoted through the press, pulpit and school.

"If we are to have a warless world, nations must adopt policies which will produce world-wide feelings of mutual confidence," the Rev. Robert C. Kuebler told the members of Friends Evangelical church, Parkway and Alabama streets.

"So long as nations are suspicious and afraid of one another and so long as they depend upon the strength of their own right arm in securing justice, war will exist and grow," he predicted.

"Is the state leaving the church behind?" the Rev. Joseph G. Moore, pastor of Capitol Avenue M. E. church, asked in a sermon pointing out the progress governments are making toward world peace.

Public Opinion Necessary

"Many nations have ratified the Kellogg pact," he declared, "but what will it amount to if there is no Pentecostal power in it all. The pact must be backed up with sentiment and public opinion. Right here is the opportunity of the church to bless the world."

Christ alone can turn swords into plowshares, the Rev. Forest A. Reed told his congregation at the Brookside United Brethren church.

"We can help the cause of peace by helping people to know Christ," he declared.

Danger of a mere passive, rather than active, interest in the promotion of peace was pointed out by the Rev. P. P. Stocker in a sermon at the First Methodist Episcopal church, Twenty-second street and Broadway.

Sentiment Must Crystallize

"The crying necessity," he asserted, "is that the inarticulate, unorganized body of sentiment for peace shall be crystallized in support of the proposals that give promise of elim-

inating war between civilized nations."

"Thinking Peace" was the topic chosen by the Rev. E. E. Moorman, pastor of Linwood Christian church. "No real progress can be made in the way of peace until the civilized world becomes peace-minded and begins to think peace," he predicted.

TALKS ON ASTRONOMY

C. of C. Secretary Suggests Death "Promotion" of Intelligence

Belief that other planets are inhabited by human beings was expressed by Edward Hunter, Chamber of Commerce secretary, in a talk on "Astronomy" before the Nature Study Club Saturday night at Brookside Community House.

"It would be a great waste of energy if life exists only on this earth, which is merely a pill in the planetary system. I always have believed that intelligence can not be destroyed. So we just may advance from one planet to another," Hunter declared.

PERSHING TO RETURN

General Will Sail for United States From France on Tuesday.

PARIS, Nov. 11.—General John J. Pershing, after a year in France, will leave on the liner Leviathan for New York Tuesday.

General Pershing took part in the Armistice day ceremonies here today. A projected trans-Atlantic telephone call to the American Legion at home was called off because of difficulty in assuring a connection.

FLU SWEEPS BRITAIN

LONDON, Nov. 11.—A mild form of influenza spread throughout Great Britain over the week-end, resulting in a few deaths. The cases were featured by excessive swelling of the throat and acute bodily pains.

The cases developed with extreme swiftness. Many business houses reported their staffs depleted by from 5 to 15 per cent.

BORAH ATTACKS HYPOCRISY OF ARMED NATIONS

Talk of Peace Is Called
Futile While World
Seeks Strength.

Senator William E. Borah, chairman of the important senate foreign committee, a man known throughout the world's capitals, has written for the United Press a brief article on the peace outlook on this, the anniversary of the armistice in the World War. His views assume unusual importance in view of his commanding position in the senate's foreign committee and in view of the forthcoming arms conference in London. The article follows.

By SENATOR WILLIAM E. BORAH (Copyright, 1929, by The Times) WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—The soldiers are leaving the Rhine;

debts and reparations have been adjusted; a pact has been signed by all nations renouncing war as an arbiter in international controversies.

These are great movements in the direction of world peace. They give some assurance that nations are approaching the time when they shall have respect for law. Armistice day, in the year 1929, is rich in assurance, therefore, of peace.

But the real test soon is to come. Will we put away some of these vast armaments which are not for peace, but for war? In view of all of our protestations for peace, are we not willing to seal our faith with our deeds and reduce the stupendous machines fit for nothing on earth except to do that which we profess we are not going to do.

An armed world is a fighting world, and peace pacts, whatever may be their terms or how universal their application, will not make it otherwise. If the nations are not willing to reduce drastically their implements of war, we can not hope

to realize what the peace pacts imply.

It is often said that war between Great Britain and the United States is "unthinkable." That is flimsy and jaded rhetoric. We give plenty of proof that war between the United States and Great Britain is thinkable and that we are thinking about it constantly while building and maintaining and continuing to increase the most formidable navies in the world.

Armistice, therefore, should be a day for renewed efforts in the cause of peace, as well as a day for rejoicing over achievements already recorded.

The world has no need of the stupendous armaments now burdening the people of every nation under the sun. And the people of the world should organize and direct public opinion to the end that these armaments be reduced.

That would not only be evidence of our faith, but an incalculable blessing to humanity.
