

FACES CHARGES OF BIGAMY AND CHECK FRAUDS

St. Louis Business Man Held on Complaint of Second Wife.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 22.—Thomas C. Jones, electric sign company president, was enmeshed in a tangle today that included police investigation into his private and business life.

He was held on complaint of a Columbus (O.) attorney, who claimed Jones married the former Mrs. Margaret Brehm of Columbus, while still married to his first wife. He faced a charge also of obtaining money under false pretenses, through issuance of allegedly worthless checks.

Mrs. Ryta Travis, Kansas City, who at first told police "I am his wife," but later said she was "his secretary," was detained for questioning.

Jones said he believed he had been divorced from his first wife, seven years ago, and married Mrs. Brehm at Knoxville, Tenn., last February.

The worthless check charge concerned payment of thirteen employees of Jones' sign company here, who claimed they received checks totaling \$6,000, which they were unable to cash.
