TIMES SURVEY BARES SOURCES OF RADIO GRIEF

Refusal to Trim Trees Is
Reason for Much of
Interference.

Radio interference of such intensity that it was impossible to turn a set on without deafening roars, cracks and rumbles was uncovered this week, originating in the district bounded by Brookville road, Arlington avenue, the C. H. & D. railroad and Emerson avenue.

The interference, from several causes, was due mainly to the high tension wires coming from the Lenora substation. These wires are carried on the same poles as Indianapolis Power and Light Company lines and the interference from the high tension line was being fed inductively into the circuits supplying street lights and house current.

Trouble men for the power company also were successful in finding several cases of wires being off insulators and laying on the wood cross-arms of the poles. Several broken insulators were also found.

It is estimated that from six to ten thousand radio listeners were affected by this trouble. The power company is now busy remediying the causes.

Interference in the northwest section of the city was traced to a common cause that can be removed only by home owners in the district.

Power wires that should be kept as far as possible from trees have been strung in what looks like a basket pattern through the trees of many residents of the district. The home owners are responsible for this, in that they will not give permission to have the trees cut down or trimmed.

As long as the trees are there, radio interference will affect the district. This is particularly noticeable in the section surrounding Forty-second street and Rockwood avenue.
