SEEK MISSING BUSINESS MAN

Police Asked to Search for Otis F. Calvin.

Police of mid-western cities were asked today to search for Otis F. Calvin, 65, president of the Indianapolis Sand and Gravel Company, who disappeared from his home, 4060 Graceland avenue, Friday night.

Illness, resulting in a nervous breakdown, is believed to have caused Calvin to wander away from his home.

Friday night he told relatives, "I'm going out to get a cigar."

He left the house and was seen last by a clerk in the drug store of Carl J. Reichel, Fortieth street and the Boulevard place, as he purchased the cigar.

Relatives say he had but a small amount of money and no rings or jewelry of value when he left.

He wore a gray cap, brown overcoat, and dark suit when left home. He was 5 feet 6 inches in height.

LACQUER BLAST HURLS FIRE CHIEF 20 FEET

Leader at South Bend Unhurt as \$35,000 Damage Results.

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Dec. 16.—Roy A. Knoblock, chief of the South Bend fire department, escaped unhurt when he was hurled twenty feet by an explosion during a four-alarm fire.

The chief was directing firemen in checking a blaze in the plant of the Reliable Window Cleaners, a shade and decorating company, when a large vat of lacquer exploded.

Only the fact that the chief instinctively threw his arms to his face saved him from serious burns in the burst of flames that followed the explosion.

Fourteen residents in an apartment above the store escaped injury. The S. D. Moran radio store, and the Reliable company building were destroyed. Loss is estimated at \$35,000.

SCHWAB SPEECH TO BE HEARD BY FACTORY HEADS

Steel Magnate to Talk at Banquet Tonight at Columbia Club.

Charles M. Schwab, chairman of the board of directors of the Bethlehem Steel Corporation, came to Indianapolis today to speak at the annual banquet of the Indiana Manufacturers' Association at 6:30 tonight in the Columbia Club.

Shortly after his arrival Schwab left his private car to visit with friends and business associates in the city.

Meetings of the Manufacturers' Association opened this afternoon with reports of the organization's work and discussion of a proposal to increase the directorate from sixteen to twenty-four members.

A resolution proposing a reduction in corporation income tax rates was discussed.

Members of the association also considered the shipping facilities offered by the Great Lakes-to-Gulf of Mexico waterway.

Philip Zoercher, member of the state tax board, explained taxation problems to the association.

At tonight's banquet members of the Indianapolis section of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers have been invited to hold their meeting in conjunction with the state manufacturers.
