

INDIA IS READY TO CALL FOR INDEPENDENCE

Home Rule Demand Will Be Voiced at Meeting of National Congress.

CALCUTTA, India, Dec. 27.—The move to have the Indian national congress meeting at Lahore declare complete independence of India from Great Britain, gained headway today. The working committee of the congress passed, without change, Mahatma Gandhi's resolution defining Swaraj (the home rule movement) as "complete independence," and advocating a boycott of the Indian legislatures. Amendments extending the boycott to law courts and schools were tabled for the formal opening of the sessions of the congress Sunday. Tentative draft of a declaration of independence has been drawn and is expected to be acted on by the congress before Jan. 1. At that time, the Indian ultimatum demanding definite promise of dominion status and amnesty for political prisoners will expire. Britain has refused to accede to the demands.

SCHOOL RULING GIVEN

Districts to Provide Children With Transportation.

Districts which do not have junior or senior high schools must provide transportation to such schools for children under 16 who have finished the grades, Attorney-General James M. Ogden ruled today. The opinion was given upon request of Miss Blanche Merry, state attendance officer. These transportation costs have figured largely in depleted treasuries of state aid schools it was said.

Ministers to Meet for Annual Winter Session

Disciples of Christ Church Preachers Will Hold Two-Day Parley.

Ministers of the Disciples of Christ church in Indiana will meet in their annual mid-year session of the Indiana Christian Ministerial Association Monday and Tuesday in the Central Christian church. The opening meeting will be held at 7:30 Monday night. The theme of the session will be "The Christian Brotherhood." At 9:30 Tuesday morning "The Preacher and His Reading" will be discussed with W. E. Moore of Bloomington presiding. Speakers will be A. L. Ward of Noblesville and Carl H. Barnett of Lebanon. Tuesday afternoon the "Pentecost" will feature the discussion with B. H. Bruner chairman. Speakers will be W. R. Warren, vice-president of the pension fund, and S. J. Corey, vice-president of the United Christian Missionary Society. At the closing session on Tuesday night the discussion will center on "A Closer Fellowship Between Baptists and Disciples." W. F. Rotherburger, Indianapolis, and Charles M. Dinmore, state secretary for the Baptists, will be the speakers.

MOUNT VERNON IS VISITED BY MEXICAN CHIEF

Rubio Also Pays Visit to Tomb of America's Unknown Soldier.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—The best known as well as least known

of American heroes received the homage of President-elect Pascual Ortiz Rubio of Mexico today as he visited Mt. Vernon, home of George Washington, and the tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington cemetery. After placing a wreath, the president-elect and his party proceeded to Arlington, where they were greeted by the twenty-one-cannon presidential salute. An army band played the Mexican national anthem as Ortiz Rubio stepped to the Unknown Soldier's grave. On leaving the cemetery, the party stopped at Ft. Myer, where the president-elect inspected

the cavalry troops that had acted as his escort. The presidential salute was given again as the party departed. While at Mount Vernon the President-elect made the following statement: "The simplicity of the life of Washington is attested to by all aspects of his home and its surroundings. That home and simplicity really is the cradle of all democracies. The respect and veneration with which the American people keep this in memory of Washington gives a good idea of the real magnitude of the man and his work." BRIGHT PUPILS HOLD RADICAL LAW VIEWS

Lockhart of Drake university reported to educators at a meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. Professor Lockhart added that the significance of this finding may be far-reaching and worthy of exhaustive research. To compare the attitude of youth

today toward law enforcement with the attitude regarded as ideal by adults, Professor Lockhart found out how fifty leading lawyers of Iowa and fifty of the best graduate students regarded important questions of law enforcement. Then 3,500 Iowa school children, from grade four up to high school seniors gave their opinions on the same questions.
