

MEXICO SEVERS RELATIONS WITH SOVIET RUSSIA

Government Closes Legation in Moscow, Formally Cuts Off Ties.

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 24.—The first Soviet legation in the western hemisphere was closed here today and interest was centered in the reaction from Moscow to Mexico's severance of diplomatic relations with Russia.

The summary announcement that the recent recurrence of Communists' attacks on Mexican embassies in Washington, Buenos Aires and Rio De Janeiro had forced the government to close its legation in Moscow and formally break off diplomatic relations caused a flurry in the capital.

The Mexican government declared, however, that the attacks, as well as other manifestations of unfriendliness toward Mexico, has made it impossible to continue its policy of tolerance.

In recent weeks Mexico has deported several groups of alleged foreign Communists and agitators and imprisoned numerous Mexicans on similar charges.

An official statement declared the Mexican government had attempted to maintain friendly relations toward the Soviet, but that this was unreciprocated by Russia.

The immediate cause of the break, it is believed, was a Communist demonstration outside the Mexican embassy in Rio De Janeiro on Tuesday, when forty Reds, throwing stones at the building, shouted:

"Down with Mexico! The government of Mexico is sold to the clericals and North American imperialism!"
