

1,000 IN RACE RIOT FOLLOWING SPORT CONTEST

Negroes and Whites Fight
for Hour Near Campus of
Chicago U.

CHICAGO, March 21.—Nearly 1,000 persons, approximately half Negroes and half white, rioted for nearly an hour near the University of Chicago campus Thursday night over the result of a basketball game at the university gymnasium in which a team from a white high school defeated one from a Negro institution.

Police squads from four stations, numbering 100 men, battled with the rioters until they were subdued. A score of heads were battered and seven street cars had been commandeered by the crowd before police arrived.

The trouble started when Negro fans who had backed the Wendell Phillips high school team became involved in an argument with Calumet high school fans over the referee's decisions. Calumet had won the game 25 to 22.

A street car stopped at the intersection and the Negroes were said to have boarded it, ejected other passengers and torn off the trolley pole. The dispute then became general and six more cars were seized. Only one rioter was arrested. He was carrying a revolver.

NEGRO IS GIVEN LONG SENTENCE FOR ASSAULT

Heavy Prison Terms Meted
Out to Attacker by
Collins.

Heavy prison sentences were meted out by Criminal Judge James A. Collins today to Edward Davis, 43, Negro, of 907 Kappes street, convicted of being one of two Negroes who kidnaped and criminally attacked a white woman the night of Feb. 10.

One the kidnaping charge Davis was fined \$100 and costs and sentenced to from two to fourteen years' imprisonment, while he was sentenced to five to twenty-one years on the attack charge. The sentences will run concurrently.

Evidence against him was based on his confession and testimony of Mrs. Mary Conrad, 43, of 617 North Drexel avenue, who told of her kidnaping and the attack by two men who dragged her into the car.

James Walker, Negro, implicated

by Davis in his confession, will be tried March 25. He has denied guilt.

WETTER BALKS AT \$7,000 FINE

Cuts Junk Man's Penalty to
to \$50 and Costs.

Faced with the fact that Harry Miller, junk yard owner of 3935 Central avenue, was guilty of an offense involving fines totaling more than \$7,000, Judge Paul G. Wetter balked in municipal court today. Instead, he fined Miller, charged

with failing to carry workmen's compensation insurance, \$50 and costs.

The Indiana law under which Ora Wilson, former employee of Miller, of 1124 South Fleming avenue, charged Miller with failing to carry insurance provides a fine of \$10 and costs, with each day's violation constituting a separate offense. It was shown in court Miller had failed to carry the insurance for a period of two years, involving fines totaling \$7,300.

Wilson, injured in Miller's junk yard, filed the charge when he was unable to collect compensation. "I can not assess such a fine," Judge Wetter declared, and fixed the \$50 and costs penalty.
