

## M'NUTT LASHES 'CORRUPTION' IN G.O.P. RECORD

Democratic Keynoter Hurls Challenge Over Radio Station Hookup.

Laid bare by Paul V. McNutt, Indiana today saw spread before its eyes a record of "corruption, inefficiency and misrepresentation" which the Democratic leaders feel will result in their installation in power at the polls Nov. 4.

Availing himself of this opportunity to answer the "plaintive question" of Senator James E. Watson, the Democratic campaign keynoter hurried through the air over a three-station hook-up Wednesday night vitriolic criticism of "Republican national and state misrule."

Thousands of party workers and independent voters heard the Democratic challenger in their homes and at county and district rallies. The McNutt speech was prefaced by the introduction of state candidates by R. Earl Peters, Democratic state chairman.

### Candidates Speak

Candidates pledged themselves to faithful and efficient performance of duty if elected and speedy justice from the high courts. The introduction and addresses were delivered from the studio of station WFBM here and were carried into northern Indiana through WOWO at Ft. Wayne, and into the southern section by station WGBF, Evansville.

Declaring that Watson's question as to "what would any Democrat have done that Hoover did not do in order to keep faith with the people" is a direct admission of failure by the Republican party, McNutt said, "the difference between Republican and Democratic achievement is the difference between form and substance."

Republican spokesmen stated that the two main propositions involved in the 1928 Republican platform were farm relief and tariff revision." McNutt declared. "A federal farm board was created, which is the form, but farmers still are waiting for economic equality with other industries, which is the substance."

### Wheat Stump Cited

"Within the last few weeks the price of wheat fell to its lowest level in a quarter of a century, and the price of corn has been affected adversely."

"The tariff revision has resulted in forcing the farmer to pay an additional \$10 in price for what he consumes for every dollar of theoretical increase in the price of his own products."

"Wage earners, without hope of increased returns for their service and suffering from curtailment and loss of employment, will pay one billion dollars additional for what they use. The unprotected manufacturer is losing his foreign market without compensation for loss, and foreign nations have retaliated by instituting reprisals."

### Highway Board Lashed

"In all fairness at least it must be said that one promise made by the Republican party has been performed," McNutt said. "That promise was flood control and it was performed by a drought over which no political party has any control."

The keynoter then plunged into the welter of state administration "inefficiency, extravagance and corruption."

"An issue of first importance has to do with the state highway department, which is costing more than \$20,000,000 each year and the people are willing to spend that vast sum provided they receive one dollar of value for each dollar expended."

"The Commission on Budget dragged out the construction and maintenance has been paid for in cash under the pay-as-we-go system. At this minute the highway commission is

## LEGS DIAMOND MAY RECOVER, SAY DOCTORS

Police Know Names of Three at Conference Before Hotel Shooting.

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—Jack (Legs) Diamond, racketeer, who was thought fatally wounded after assailants shot him four times Sunday morning, is clinging tenaciously to life today and even showing signs of improvement.

Diamond is showing the same physical stamina that pulled him through when he was shot in 1927, at the time Little Augie Orden was murdered.

Physicians said today he still has a chance of recovery unless pneumonia sets in.

Edward P. Mulrooney, police commissioner, said he knew the names of three of the four men who visited Diamond at the Monticello hotel Friday night. Mulrooney believes two of these men were the ones who returned Sunday morning to Diamond's hotel room and shot him.

## FAVOR LAW REVISION

School Superintendents Take Indecisive Vote.

In an indecisive fashion the County School Superintendents' Association voted indorsement of a state constitutional convention at a meeting Wednesday in the Lincoln.

The indorsement was voted after a brief dispute. It was followed by a motion to reconsider, which was defeated, with only half of the members voting.

Retrenchment in education, even distribution of support for the state school system, were urged in a report by the resolutions committee.

The business session of the association followed addresses by Dr. George D. Strayer, Columbia university; Dr. W. W. Wright of Indiana university, and Dr. Walter F. Dexter, president of Whittier college, Whittier, Cal.

Valuation Decreased

From 1921 until 1930 under Republican rule the net value of taxables has decreased \$671,830,665, the total taxes levied have increased \$38,598,247, the mortgage exemptions deducted have increased \$48,125,456, and the amount expended for township poor relief has increased \$1,70,164.
