Adolph Hitler reappeared in his favorite Munich in March, 1925—once more in a beer hall. Three thousand frenzied followers welcomed him back.

Hitler made no attempt to put a bridle on his tongue. He slammed the Jews. He slammed the government and the Reichstag. He proclaimed his unrepentant nationalism. He slammed the November "criminals."

Premier Held did not like it. But Hitler attempted no putsches. He had done some reflecting, if not thinking, while he was in prison.

Believing in his star, he also believed that time was working in his favor. There was high taxation in Germany. There was business depression. There was unemployment. There was the constant party wrangling in the Reichstag, with continual changes in the government.
