

MOTHER OF TWO SHOT DOWN IN FRONT OF HOME

Search for Murderer Is Extended Throughout New England.

BRATTLEBORO, Vt., Nov. 13.—Search for the murderer of Mrs. Doris Spafford Herrick, 27, mother of two children, who was shot and killed in front of her home here Wednesday night, extended all over New England today.

Police were seeking Leon Baldwin, 33, of Easthampton, Mass., who vanished in an automobile after he had been seen talking with the slain woman. Several persons said they heard two shots.

Mrs. Herrick had been separated from her husband. She came here from Springfield, Mass., last month. Baldwin, who had been a garage mechanic there, followed her.

Police Chief Patrick O'Keefe said he learned Baldwin had been keeping company with the woman. Baldwin also is married, he said, but has not been living with his wife.

I. U. PRESIDENT WILL ATTEND 3 MEETINGS

National Session to Take Dr. Bryan East for Several Days.

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., Nov. 13.—President William Lowe Bryan of Indiana university, will leave Saturday week to attend three important national meetings in the east.

The first of these is the meeting of the National Association of State Universities to be held in Washington, Monday and Tuesday.

On Wednesday, President Bryan will go to New York for a meeting of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching of which association he is a trustee.

He will return to Washington for the meeting which President Hoover has called on child welfare. He was asked by President Hoover to be a delegate to this conference, which will be in session from Nov. 19 to 22. Dr. Bryan will return to Bloomington about Nov. 23.

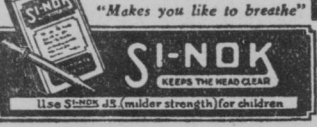
Dr. Ezra E. Voyles was nominated for president on the other ticket including:

NEW CHANNEL TO BE OPENED WITH DYNAMITE

White River to Be Backed Up to 12-Foot Depth as Blasts Go Off.

New channel of White river between Morris and Raymond streets will be opened at 2:15 Friday afternoon when dynamite blasts are set off, while city, state and railroad officials witness the event.

The old river channel was dammed to a point west of the new \$1,000,000 Belt railroad bridge and the water now has backed up into the new channel to a depth of about eight feet. By the time the explosive is ignited, the depth should have reached twelve feet.

Straightening of the channel is part of the flood prevention program.

EDITOR GUARDED FROM KIDNAPING

California Seeks to Break Up Ransom Gang.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 13.—An asserted plot to kidnap Harry Chandler, millionaire publisher of the Los Angeles Times, and to hold him for ransom, was discounted today by District Attorney Burton R. Fitts and Chandler himself, although it was admitted a guard has been placed over the publisher's home.

Fitts admitted that his deputies had been working toward the arrest of a group of Chicago and Kansas City gangsters who have come to California for the winter.

At least three prominent men, two of them business men and third a liquor racketeer, Fitts said, have been kidnaped in the last few months here.

The victims, in each case, paid high ransom money for their liberty, Fitts revealed, and remained silent.

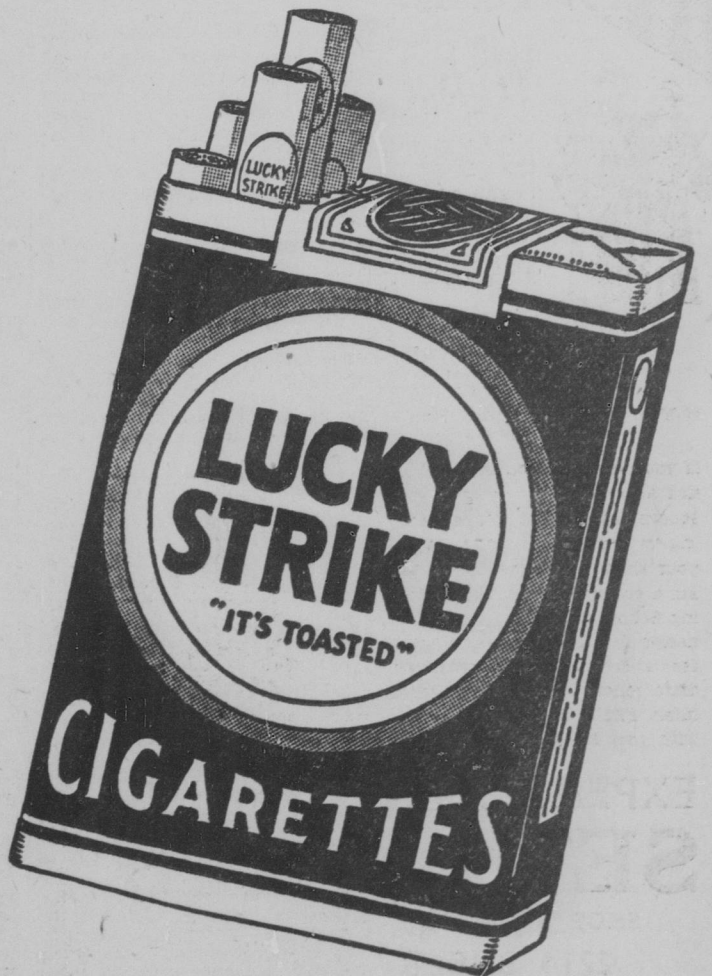
