

LESLIE FORCES HUFF CHOICE AS BUDGET CHIEF

New Chairman Unfamiliar
With Work; Farrell Fails
to Get Post.

Governor Harry G. Leslie was reported today to have dictated the election of State Senator Byron Huff (Rep., Martinsville) to the chairmanship of the state budget committee.

Huff was elected by the budget committeemen, upon motion of Representative Sam Farrell (Rep., Hartford City) at the budget committee organization meeting Thursday afternoon.

Farrell himself had been said to have been scheduled for the place. But Leslie gave Farrell his reappointment on the committee, knowing its legality had been questioned and without asking an opinion from the attorney-general's office.

Evidently feeling that this was sufficient he is said to have wanted Huff in the chairmanship.

Huff is entirely unfamiliar with budget committee work, it being his first services as a budget committeeman. Farrell and Senator Thurman A. Gottschalch (Dem., Berne) are holdover members of the committee, both having been reappointed.

The other new Democratic member is Representative H. Curtis Bennett of Dillsboro.

ROUTS CHICKEN THIEVES


Owner Fires at Pair in Coop; One

Two chicken thieves, one of whom is believed wounded, are sought by deputy sheriffs today.


Carl Baker, 3548 West Morris street, said he fired three times at men who were in a chicken coop in the rear of his house Friday night.
